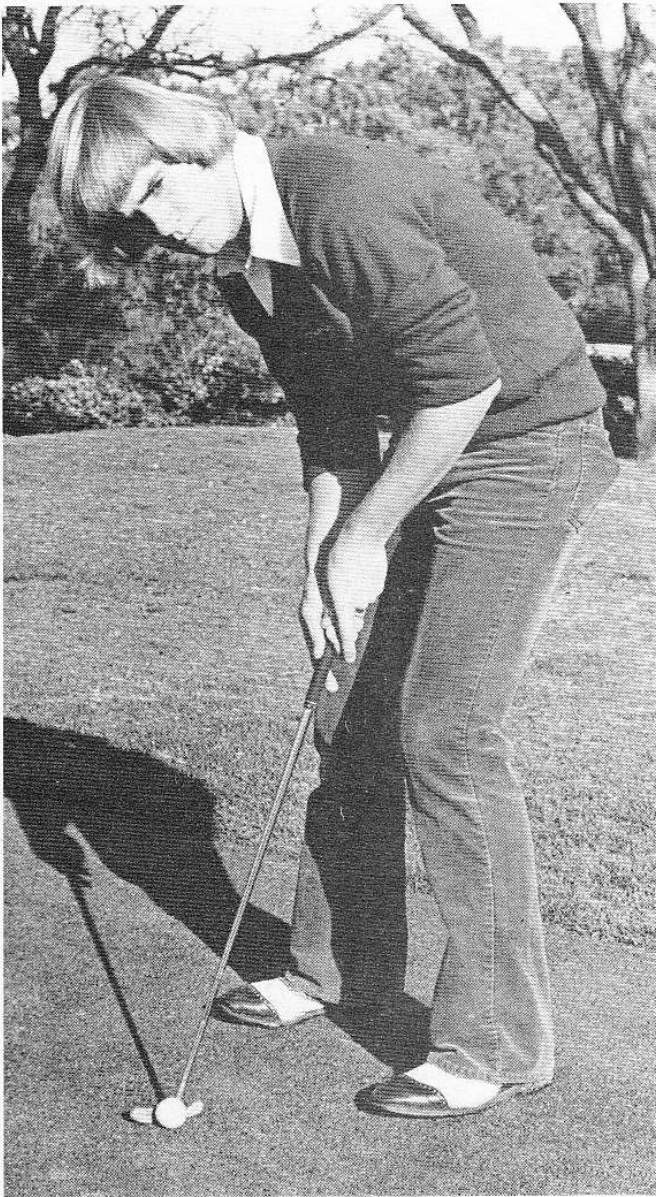

STANFORD GOLF COURSE

Located west of campus off Junipero Serra Boulevard, the 18-hole Stanford Golf Course has been rated among the top 100 courses in the United States by Golf Digest. The par 71, 6,835-yard home of the Stanford golf teams was built in 1928-29 exclusively with Stanford Athletic Funds. Women's par for the 5,909-yard course is 76.

A flat par-36 front nine and hilly par-35 back side combine for what is considered one of the most challenging courses in the nation. It is laid out around some 300 oak trees, with the San Francisquito Creek, which divides Santa Clara and San Mateo counties, running through. Of the courses' 300 acres, about 180 are grass with the balance combining rough and hazards.

The men's course record of 63 was set by Bud Brownell in 1941--a Stanford student at the time--and matched by Frank Zack in 1950. The pro course record was set in 1952 by current Stanford golf coach Bud Finger at 64, including a two-stroke penalty. Jo Anne Gunderson Carner, while a student at Arizona State University, set the women's course record of 71 in 1960.

MEN'S OUTLOOK

Stanford golf coach Bud Finger will head rather an inexperienced team in his 17th season on the Farm. Finger lost four of his top players to graduation last spring--a loss which makes Stanford's season outlook a question mark.

Gone are Conrad Nilmeier and Dave Baskins, both first-team all-Pac 8 selections; George Pettinger, a second-team choice; and Aly Trompas, a four-year stand-out. Baskins was also champion of the San Francisco City Tournament last year.

The Cards do have a solid, if small, weteren nucleus on which to rely, headed by Mike Peck, a sophomore from Prairie Village, Kan. Peck was the top Stanford finisher in the NCAA championships last year as a freshman, placing 16th. He also finished fourth in the longest drive competition, with a best of 287 yards.

"Mike hits the ball a country mile," says Finger. "He also has a fine putting touch. All he needs is to be a little more consistent."

Also returning is Jay Johnston, another NCAA Tournament veteran. Johnston, a junior from New Canaan, Conn., is probably Stanford's second best player, according to Finger.

The other top pre-season qualifiers are Doug Rice, Wade Nonnenberg, John Baity, and Glenn Goethals.

Rice, a freshman from Menlo Park, was Player of the Year in the South Peninsula Athletic League in 1975. He was second qualifier in pre-season trials and appears to have a bright future at Stanford.

Nonnenberg, a senior from Pittsburgh, Pa., led all qualifiers until the final round. "He has been playing fine golf lately," says Finger.

Goethals qualified for the U.S. Amateur last year and in 1973 and placed fourth in the Pac-8 in 1974. The junior from Cincinnati needs only consistency to realize "tremendous potential" according to his coach.

Baity, a sophomore from Rye, N.Y., has shown considerable improvement over last year and looks ready for varsity competition.

Finger has good words for another freshman, Tom Hales, who qualified eighth in pre-season trials. "It's unusual for a freshman to qualify so high", Finger says. "He could help this year."

Yet another player who figures in Stanford's plans is Ray Navis, a sophomore from Van Nuys. Navis, a high school All-America, is out of school this quarter but will join the squad this spring.

Finger is cautious in assessing his team's chances this season. "We lost the four starters and they'll be tough to replace," he says. "It all depends upon how well our young players come along. This will be a good opportunity for them to gain experience."

Charles E. "Bud" Finger

Head Coach

Stanford golf coach Bud Finger has built and maintained a winning golf tradition at the University through 28 years.

Under his guidance, Stanford has won 12 conference championships and claimed second place league finishes eight times. Finger's golfers have never finished below fourth in either the old Pacific Coast Conference or the present Pacific-8.

Nationally, the Cards have performed as well under Finger. In 27 years of NCAA competition, Stanford has finished in the top ten 16 times and in the top twenty 23 times. The Card linksmen won the NCAA Championships in 1953, finished second in 1957, and third in both 1950 and 1959.

Over the years, Finger has tutored such standouts as Tom Watson, Warren Dailey, Fred Brown, Dick McElyea, Grant Spaeth, Kent Winton, Bill Seanor, Chuck Van Linge, Steve Smith and former Stanford and San Francisco 49er quarterback John Brodie.

A 1941 graduate of Stanford, Finger helped bring NCAA Team Championships to the Farm in 1939 and 1941. Currently he holds course records at San Francisco's Lincoln Park (61), the Presidio Golf Club (65) and Millbrae's Green Hills Country Club (64). He once fired a 64 on the Stanford course, including a two-stroke penalty, which is just one shot above the standing course record.

Bud and his wife Bobby live in Los Altos Hills. They are the parents of four children--Paula, a Stanford graduate; Randy, a former varsity golf starter and graduate of Purdue; Tim, a student at Foothill College; and Barbara, a sophomore at St. Francis High.

1976 WOMEN'S OUTLOOK

A second consecutive Northern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (NCIAC) title and a strong finish in the AIAW Nationals are the goals of the 1976 Stanford women's golf team. 1975 All-Conference players Pam Cornett and Pam Palmieri return for their last year of college play, backed by outstanding freshman Sally Voss and a talented group of returnees.

Coach Carroll Diaz sees her Cardinal squad as one of the top 10 teams in the nation.

"I expect our team to come out at the top in the Nationals this year," Diaz says. "We don't have the depth some of the contenders do, but we should prove our strength with Cornett, Palmieri and Voss."

For the AIAW Championships this year, Stanford will field a team of four for the first time. In the past, the Cards were entered on an individual basis.

The one-two punch of Cornett and Palmieri could make Stanford's first team effort in the nationals one to remember.

"Pat and Pam make the best team Stanford has ever had," says the Card coach of her two seniors. "This gives a greater chance in team championships."

Winner of the 1975 San Francisco City Open, Cornett claimed individual honors in leading her teammates to titles in the Arizona State Sun Devil Invitational and the Oregon Daisy Duck Invitational last year. Among the nation's top amateurs, Cornett was third in the AIAW Nationals in 1975.

Palmieri was the San Francisco City Open titlist in '72 as a freshman at Stanford. Along with Cornett, she was awarded one of the University's first nine scholarships for women athletes last spring.

An outstanding addition to the Cardinal squad is freshman Sally Voss, upon whom Diaz pins Stanford's hopes for the future.

"Sally has shown a lot of potential, and possesses a great deal of natural golf talent," Diaz says. "She's playing right behind Pat and Pam at this time and should move up to number one when they are graduated in June."

In 1975, the Bethesda, Md., product was the Middle Atlantic Junior Girls Champion, runner-up in the Maryland State Women's Amateur, and a qualifier for the U.S. Junior Girls Championship.

Great depth is added to the '76 Cardinals by juniors Ellen Sale, Libby Docker and Darragh Davis, and sophomore Sue Hoover. Both Davis and Hoover are relative newcomers to golf, having picked up the game after entering Stanford.

Carroll Diaz

Women's Golf Coach

Carroll Diaz has served as the Stanford women's golf coach all her twenty years at the University. In addition to coaching, she instructs badminton and posture classes, and serves as an undergraduate advisor.

A graduate of Indiana University, she received her masters' degree in physical education from MacMurray College in Illinois.

At Stanford, Diaz has coached standouts including Shelly Hamlin, currently a touring professional, Linda Mauer, a former Cal State Champion, and two time National Women's Amateur Champ Ann Quast, who was recently inducted into the Stanford Athletic Hall of Fame.

In 1974, Diaz published her first book, Golf--A Beginners Guide, which has received extremely favorable reviews.

She is currently the collegiate golf coach representative to the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women committee on golf.

Diaz and her husband Al reside in Los Gatos where they raise championship beagles.

TOM WATSON PRO-AM

Again this year, 1971 Stanford graduate and defending British Open Champion Tom Watson will join forces with several top touring pros and local supporters of Stanford golf to stage the Tom Watson Pro-Am. A benefit for the Cardinal men's golf team, the tournament will be held Monday September 20, prior to the Kaiser International at Napa's Silverado Course.

Due to the overwhelming success of last year's event, the Watson Pro-Am will become an annual affair at Stanford. In 1975, proceeds were upwards of \$18,000 with a 1976 projection of around \$22,000 being made.

The tournament's format of 21-fivesomes groups four amateurs, each paying a \$250 entry fee, with one touring professional. Information on the limited entries remaining for amateurs in the 1976 Watson Pro-Am can be obtained from Alf Brandon at area code (415) 981-1515.

Among the more notable amateurs participating in the 1975 event were Bing Crosby and Robert Minich Brown, Chairman of the Stanford University Board of Trustees. Stanford graduates Watson and Bob Rosburg were joined by top professionals including Rod Funseth and Pat Fitzsimons.
