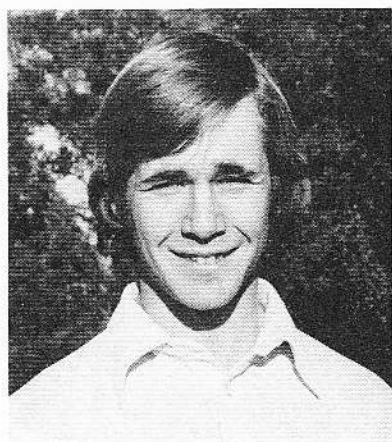

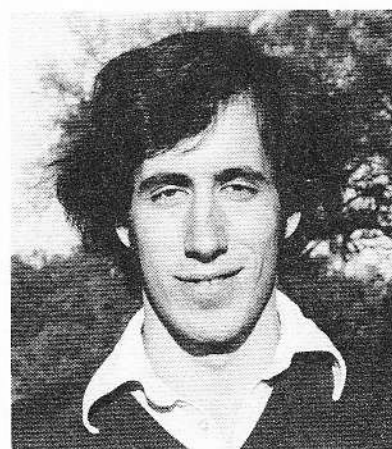

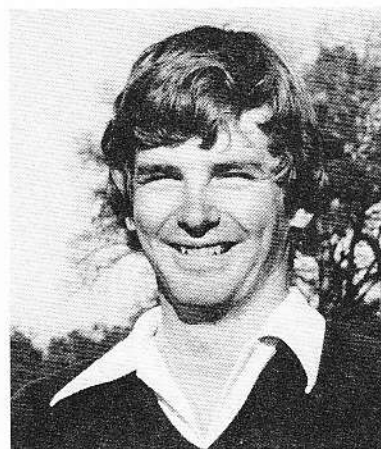

1977 MEN'S OUTLOOK

Led by All-America Mike Peck, the nucleus of Stanford's golf team returns intact for the 1977 season. The Cards boast a deep squad with the talent needed to replace graduated seniors Wade Nonnenberg and Mark McBride.

Coach Bud Finger does not hesitate to discuss the potential of the '77 squad, yet says it will take time for the players to reach a level of consistency.

"If we can get it altogether, we'll have a very competitive team," says the 29th-year coach.

Peck, a junior who last season received third team All-America honors, leads the Cardinals again this year. The two-time letterman played in the top spot for Stanford last spring on its 20th place NCAA finish squad.

"Mike's desire to play and to perfect his game have made him an outstanding player," says Finger of the junior, who in '76 finished in the top 10 in most of the Cardinal tournament efforts. "Mike has one of the longest drives in the game," his coach continues. "He hits the ball solidly, and is now concentrating on the greens,."

Peck, a product of Prairie Village, Kansas, is considered the hottest prospect out of the Kansas City area since former Stanford standout Tom Watson.

Senior Jay Johnston has nailed down the number two position on the Cardinal ladder. A regular on last year's squad, Johnston was the California State Junior College Champion in 1974 while a student at Menlo College.

Four other seniors should see action for Stanford this spring. Glenn Goethals, a varsity returnee, Bruce McDonald, Andy MacKay and Bruce Cardinal provide a great depth behind Peck and Johnston.

Finger says sophomore Kim Cater could make a strong contribution to the Cardinal six this year. "There is really no flaw in Kim's game," Finger says. "He has super potential."

Sophomore Tom Hales, called "an extremely fine player" by Finger, comes up from the JV ranks for varsity competition. "Tom is a super putter with a steady hand," Finger says.

After recording a 4-3 dual match record last season and posting three tournament wins, the Cards this year play eight dual matches, and are entered in nine tournaments. Highlighting the schedule is the annual U. S. Collegiate Invitational, April 21-23 on the Stanford Course.

Charles E. "Bud" Finger

Men's Team Coach

Now in his last season as Stanford head golf coach, Bud Finger has built and maintained a winning golf tradition at the University through 29 years.

Next season, Finger will become manager of the Stanford Golf Course and driving range, and will serve as head PGA pro at the course.

"Coaching has been a big part of my life for 28 years," Finger said, "but I'm looking forward to devoting all my energy to directing the operations of the golf course and driving range."

A search for Finger's successor is currently underway.

Under his direction, Stanford has won 12 conference championships and claimed second place league finishes nine times. Finger's golfers have never finished below fourth in either the old Pacific Coast Conference or the present Pacific-8.

Nationally, the Cards have performed as well under Finger. In 28 years of NCAA competition, Stanford has finished in the top ten 16 times and in the top twenty 24 times. The Card linksmen won the NCAA Championships in 1953, finished second in 1957, and third in both 1950 and 1959.

Over the years, Finger has tutored such standouts as Tom Watson, Warren Dailey, Fred Brown, Dick McElyea, Grant Spaeth, Kent Winton, Bill Seanor, Chuck Van Linge, Steve Smith and former Stanford and San Francisco 49er quarterback John Brodie.

A 1941 graduate of Stanford, Finger helped bring NCAA Team Championships to the Farm in 1939 and 1941. Currently he holds course records at San Francisco's Lincoln Park (61), the Presidio Golf Club (65) and Millbrae's Green Hills Country Club (64). He once fired a 64 on the Stanford course, including a two-stroke penalty, which is just one shot above the standing course record.

Bud and his wife Bobby live in Los Altos Hills. They are the parents of four children--Paula, a Stanford graduate; Randy, a former varsity golf starter and graduate of Purdue; Tim, playing number one on the Weber State tennis team; and Barbara, a junior at St. Francis H. S.

1977 WOMEN'S OUTLOOK

With the graduation of Pat Cornett and Pam Palmieri, Stanford loses its dominating force in the Northern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. However Coach Carroll Diaz looks to field a competitive team, led by two experienced returnees and a strong group of incoming freshmen.

"The conference will definitely be more interesting this year," Diaz says after coaching her team to back-to-back league titles. "It will not be nearly as one-sided."

The Cardinal coach looks for San Jose State, bolstered by a talented team of incoming freshmen, to lead the pack, with Stanford, Sacramento State and Santa Clara in close pursuit.

Heading the Cards is sophomore Sally Voss who played third on Stanford's ladder behind Cornett and Palmieri last season. A product of Bethesda, Md., Voss has won numerous state and mid-Atlantic titles, the most recent being the 1976 Women's Middle Atlantic Amateur Championship. She finished in the upper third of the AIAW Nationals last year, helping Stanford to its 12th-place finish.

"Sally is hitting the ball even better this season," Diaz says. "She should be able to qualify for the Nationals again this year."

Senior Ellen Sale should move up to the number two position. Having been in the starting line-up in '76, Sale is sporting a markedly improved game.

Freshmen prospects, Nola Miyasaki and Allison Finney, will also see extensive varsity action. Finney has come on strong during early season play and is termed "a strong hitter" by Diaz. Miyasaki, a native of Hawaii, plays an accurate game with particular prowess on the greens. She was the first girl ever to play on Punahou School's men's team.

Seniors Libby Docker, Darragh Davis and Sue Hoover provide depth to the Cardinal squad. Freshmen Kathanne Lynch and Dianne Cahoon round out the roster.

Stanford plays a total of six NCIAC matches this year, playing host to the field on the Stanford Course May 2. In other action, the linksters travel to Scottsdale, Ariz., Apr. 27-29 to compete in the Sun Devil Invitational.

Carroll Diaz
Women's Golf Coach

Carroll Diaz, in her last season as the Stanford women's golf coach, has served at that capacity all her 21 years at the University. In addition to coaching, she instructs badminton and posture classes, and serves as an undergraduate advisor. Next year, she will return to teaching full-time to supervise Stanford's physical education program in golf. Currently, there is a search underway for a new women's golf team coach.

Diaz, a graduate of Indiana University, received her master's degree in physical education from MacMurray College in Illinois.

At Stanford, Diaz has coached standouts including Shelly Hamlin, now a touring professional, Linda Maurer, a former Cal State Champion, and two-time National Women's Amateur Champ Anne Quast, who was inducted into Stanford Athletic Hall of Fame last year. Two of Diaz' top golfers--Pat Cornett, a Cal State and San Francisco City Open Champ, and Pam Palmieri, also a San Francisco City Champ--were graduated last year. The Cornett-Palmieri duo led Stanford to NCIAC titles in 1975 and 1976.

In 1974, Diaz published her first book, Golf--A Beginner's Guide, which is used as an instructional text in several major colleges.

Last year, she was the collegiate golf coach representative to the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women committee on golf. She is now serving as golf commissioner for the NCIAC.

Diaz and her husband Al reside in Los Gatos where they raise championship beagles.

TOM WATSON PRO-AM

Again this year, 1971 Stanford graduate and 1977 Bing Crosby Pro-Am and San Diego Open Champion Tom Watson will join forces with several top touring pros and local supporters of Stanford golf to stage the Third Annual Tom Watson Pro-Am. A benefit for the Cardinal men's golf team, the tournament will be held Monday, Sept. 26, prior to the Anheuser-Busch Tournament at Napa's Silverado Course.

In 1975 and '76, proceeds from the tournament were upwards of \$17,000.

The tournament's format of 21 fivesomes groups four amateurs, each paying an entry fee, with one touring professional. Information on the limited entries remaining for amateurs in the 1977 Watson Pro-Am can be obtained from Alf Brandon at area code (415) 981-1515.

Among the more notable amateurs who have participated in the Pro-Am are Bing Crosby, John Brodie, and Walter Ng. Stanford graduates Watson and Bos Rosburg were joined last year by top professionals including Rod Funseth, Pat Fitzsimons, Bob Zender, John Mahaffey and J. C. Snead.
