BRUCE SUMMERHAYS  
Head Golf Coach

The 1977 Northern California Golfer of the Year, Bruce Summerhays begins his first season as Stanford's head golf coach.

Summerhays, 34, succeeds long-time Stanford links coaches Bud Finger and Carroll Diaz. Finger, who coached the Cards to a dual meet record of 260-73-6 and 38 tournament wins in his 29 years at the helm, now serves as the PGA pro and manager of the Stanford Golf Course and Driving Range. Diaz, Stanford's women's coach for 21 years, currently supervises Stanford's physical education program in golf.

Noted as an excellent teacher as well as an outstanding player, Summerhays has won four Northern California tournaments in recent years-- the Nor-Cal Open in 1974, the Nor-Cal Match Play in '72 and '77 and the Nor-Cal Assistants in '69. He also placed third in the Bing Crosby Pro-Am in 1974, and has played in the U.S. Open four times.

Additionally, Summerhays qualified for the 1977 PGA Championship played at Pebble Beach with a fifth-place finish in the Club Professionals Championship. His highest finish on the 1977 pro tour came in the \$25,000 Sierra-Nevada Open at the Edgewood Course at South Lake Tahoe, where he took fourth.

Summerhays added international experience to his record last year. He competed on the PGA Cup Team against Britain and Ireland, and again has been selected to compete in the club pro event in '78.

Prior to coming to Stanford, Summerhays was the teaching professional at the Ancil Hoffman Golf Course in Carmichael for two years. The St. Louis, Mo. native began his pro career as the assistant at the Olympic Club in San Francisco in 1966, a position he held for eight years. He then served 18 months as the head pro at the Cameron Park Country Club in Shingle Springs.

Summerhays and his wife Carolyn live in Fremont with their children-- Shelly, 12; Bryan, 10; Joseph, 6; William, 4; Rachel, 3; Susanna, 2; and Bruce, Jr., 3 months. His brother Gary is the golf coach at Sacramento's Del Campo High School.

## 1978 MEN'S OUTLOOK

A combination of the old and the new leaves Stanford golf coach Bruce Summerhays optimistic in his first season with the Cardinal men.

The old--senior Mike Peck, a second-team All-America in 1977 and a third-team choice in '76, who begins his third season as Stanford's number one golfer.

And the new--freshman Doug Clarke of San Diego, who Summerhays believes has the potential to be one of the best collegiate golfers in the country by his senior year.

"The outlook is interesting," says Summerhays, who replaces 39-year coach Bud Finger, now manager and pro at the Stanford Golf Course. "We could surprise a lot of people if our young golfers come through."

Summerhays has a bit of rebuilding to do after Stanford's Pacific-8 Southern Division Championship and 15th-place finish in the NCAA last season. Three members of the NCAA squad--Glenn Goethals, Jay Johnston and Andy MacKay--have graduated, while junior Kim Cater will compete only part-time this season in order to concentrate on his pre-medical studies.

The leader of the Cardinals will be Peck, who finished 22nd in the 1977 NCAA Championships and tied for the Pac-8 Southern Division individual crown. The only senior on this year's squad, Peck is one of the longest drivers in the college game. The highlight of his career came in 1976, when he won the U.S. Collegiate Invitational at Stanford and tied Tom Watson's record of 212 for the three-round tournament.

But Clarke could challenge Peck for the number one spot before the season is through. The 1977 CIF Player of the Year, Clarke won the 1976 Trans-Mississippi Amateur and the '77 Southern California Amateur, and placed second in last year's Western Amateur. In winning the Southern Cal tourney, he defeated two-time defending NCAA champion Scott Simpson of USC.

Behind Peck and Clarke, Summerhays rates junior Bud Ardell. The 1976 MVP for Bakersfield J.C., Ardell came to Stanford in 1977 and played well in several varsity outings.

"He's a real sleeper," Summerhays says of Ardell. "He doesn't have a flashy reputation, but he always comes through with a good round."

A quartet of talented sophomores, led by J.C. transfer Steve Schroeder, will contend for the other spots among the top six. Schroeder, who comes to Stanford after winning MVP honors at Menlo College last season, finished third in the Northern California qualifying section of the 1977 U.S. Amateur. Summerhays says the graduate of Bellarmine Prep is the best putter among the Cardinals.

Other sophs to watch are Ken Bakst, a former New York State Junior Medalist, two-time Southern California junior champion Doug Williams and two-time Colorado state champion Jeff Armstrong.

Summerhays also cites junior Eduardo Cortes and freshman Eric Morse as strong candidates for the varsity. Cortes, from Bogota, Colombia, won two national junior tennis titles and two national prep golf titles in his home country, while Morse has played quite well for the Cards in the early meets of the season.

Overall, Summerhays says the Cards may be stronger than in 1977, but he adds that so is the rest of the conference.

"USC (fifth in 1977 NCAA meet) and UCLA are both improved. Up north Oregon (seventh in '77 NCAA) has another strong team. The competition is leveling out around the rest of the country, too."

On the national scene Summerhays rates defending champion Houston, Oklahoma State and Brigham Young the favorites, with hopes that the Cards can crack the top 15.

Highlighting the Stanford home season is the annual U.S. Collegiate Invitational, featuring many of the top teams from throughout the nation. The tournament will be held April 20-22 on the Stanford Golf Course.

## U. S. COLLEGIATE INVITATIONAL

In its ten years of existence the Stanford U. S. Collegiate Invitational Golf Tournament has grown to become one of the most outstanding intercollegiate championships in the West. The 11th U. S. Collegiate Invitational will be held this season from April 20-22 on the Stanford Golf Course.

In 1977 Gerry Simoni of San Diego State shot a 72 in the final round to pull away from the field and win the individual championship with a score of 215 for the three-round tourney. Stanford's Mike Peck, who tied the Invitational record of 212 in winning the 1976 championship, took second at 219.

San Diego State won the '77 team title with a score of 887, compared to Stanford's second-place total of 897. Stanford has won seven of the 10 team championships, including a string of six in a row from 1970-75.

Five Cardinals have won or shared the individual title. Peck shares the tournament record with former Stanford great Tom Watson, who won the title in 1971.

### PACIFIC-8 SOUTHERN DIVISION

Stanford will compete again this season in the Pacific-8 Southern Division Championships, May 1-2 in Los Angeles. Next year the Cards begin Pac-10 play with the addition of Arizona and Arizona State.

In the 1977 conference meet on the Stanford Golf Course, Stanford ended USC's string of four consecutive division championships by defeating the Trojans, 1178-1181, in the four-round tournament. UCLA was third at 1204, followed by California at 1257.

Stanford's Mike Peck, with a score of 288, tied USC's Larry Collins for medalist honors. Other Cardinal scores were: Jay Johnston (291), Kim Cater (295), Andy MacKay (304), Glenn Goethals (310) and Bruce Cardinal (313).

## 1978 WOMEN'S OUTLOOK

Though the 1978 edition of Stanford's women's golf won't have strength in numbers, first-year coach Bruce Summerhays says his six-member squad has the nucleus for a solid program on The Farm.

"We're a young team," says Summerhays, who takes over the women's team from 21-year coach Carroll Diaz, now the full-time director of Stanford's physical education program for golf. "We have to overcome a lot of the inconsistencies that hurt the women last year."

Back for her third year as the Card's top player is junior Sally Voss, twice an All Nor-Cal Conference selection. Voss has been consistently below 80 in the early matches of the season, and could contend for the league's individual title.

"She's going to be a wonderful player," Summerhays says. "She has the ability to win some tournaments this season. Sally has had some bad rounds in the past, but now she's playing with more patience and making good shots."

Voss has a lengthy list of accomplishments to her record. In addition to numerous state and Middle Atlantic titles won during her high school days in Bethesda, Md., Voss participated in the 1977 U.S. Women's Open. Summerhays lauds her ability to hit drives with distance as well as accuracy.

Battling for the number two spot behind Voss are freshman Patty Pichon and sophomore Allison Finney. Pichon, from Aurora, Colo., won state junior titles in 1974 and '76, and twice finished second in the Denver Women's Invitational. The winner of the 1977 Colgate-Palmolive Women's Golf Scholarship, Pichon held the distinction of being the first woman on the golf team at Cherry Creek High School.

"Patty is an excellent golfer right now, but will continue to improve," says Summerhays. "She is a finesse player who has the potential to develop into an outstanding collegiate golfer. Her success on the junior and prep levels speaks for itself."

Finney, who Summerhays says is the strongest member of the team, played among the Cardinals' top three as a freshman in 1977. She is a strong hitter who played on the men's golf team at New Trier East High in Winnetka, Ill.

"Allison has the capabilities to be overpowering," says Summerhays. "Few people will outdrive her during the course of the season."

Rounding out the women's squad are sophomores Kathanne Lynch and Nola Miyasaki and senior Sue Hoover. Lynch, a former Connecticut junior champion, is an outstanding athlete who is one of the Cardinals' strongest players around the greens. Miyasaki also has an accurate short game, while Hoover returns for her fourth year on the varsity.

Overall, Summerhays says his '78 squad is actually two teams in one.

"We have three girls who can consistently break 80, and another three who may at times struggle to get into the 80's. We have some good young talent, but we're short on experience."

Summerhays picks defending conference champion San Jose State as a heavy favorite in the Nor-Cal, with Stanford having a strong shot at second.

"San Jose will be extremely tough to beat. Right now I would rank them among the top four teams in the nation."

Again this year, the Nor-Cal team champion will be decided by a series of one-round tournaments alternated among the five league sites. The Stanford Golf Course will be the scene of the third round March 7. Stanford also plays host to the league's individual championship meet May 3-4.
