# STANFORD UNIVERSITY

Since its founding by Leland and Jane Stanford as a memorial to their only child, Leland Stanford Junior University has emerged as one of the foremost academic institutions in the world. Organized in 1891, the University covers some 8,200 acres from the plain of the Santa Clara Valley into the foothills of the Santa Cruz Mountains, beyond which lies the Pacific Ocean.

Annually, Stanford enrolls approximately 11,700 students, of whom 6,500 are undergraduates, and 5,200 are graduates. The University uses no racial, religious, ethnic, geographical or sex-related quotas in admissions. About 48 percent of the students are from California, and the rest from the other 49 states and some 70 countries. Black, Chicano and native American students comprise about 10 percent of the enrollment.

The university is organized into seven Schools: Earth Sciences, Education, Engineering, Graduate School of Business, Humanities and Sciences, Medicine and Law. Within the Schools, there are 70 departments. In addition, there are 27 centers, 12 institutes, eight laboratories and 16 specialized programs outside the school structure. Some of the major ones are the Hoover Institution on War, Revolution and Peace, the Food Research Institute, the Center for Research in International Studies, the W.W. Hansen Laboratories of Physics, and the Stanford Linear Accelerator Center.

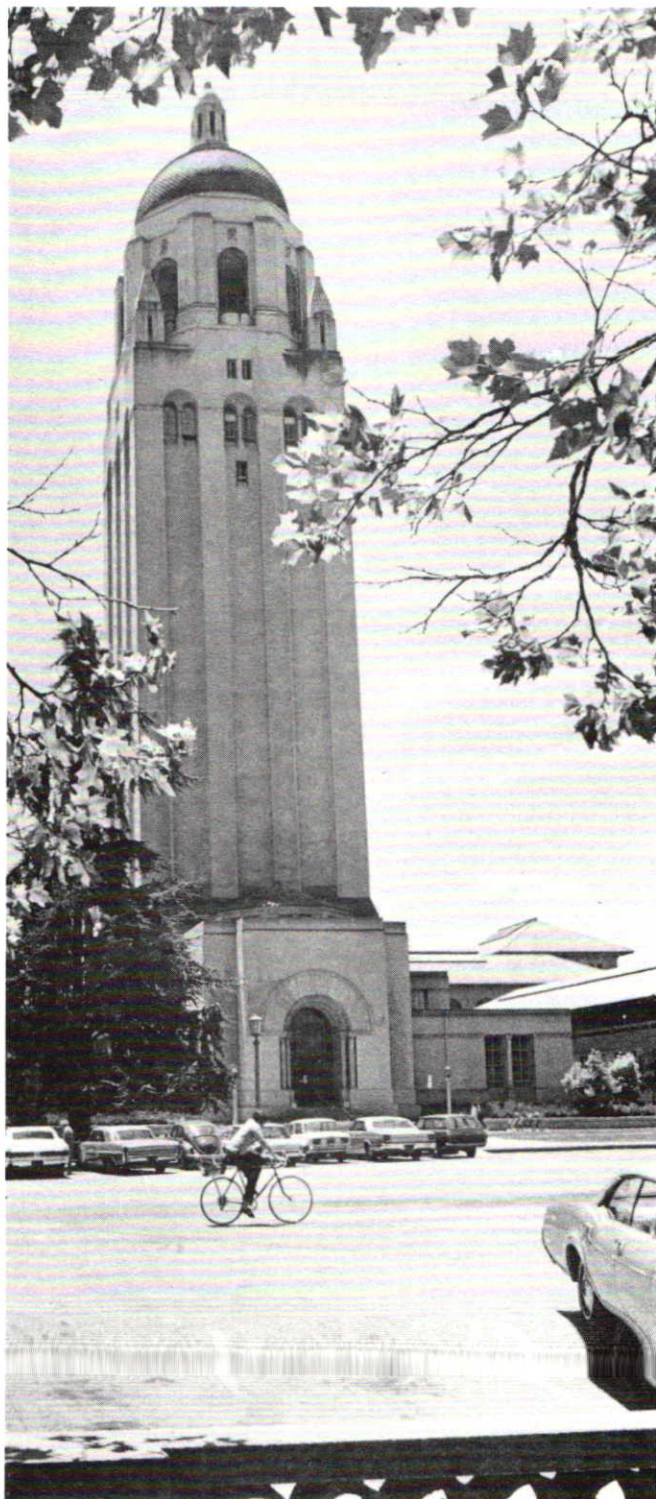
Since 1957, Stanford has moved from thirteenth to third in the overall excellence of its graduate programs in humanities, sciences and engineering, according to surveys of the American Council on Education. Last year, the Graduate School of Business was rated first in the nation, as was the Graduate School of Education. Both the Engineering and Medical Schools were ranked second nationally while the Law School was rated third in surveys by deans of the respective schools.

A measure of undergraduate distinction is found in the increase in applicants, now running at about seven applicants for each place in the freshman class. Forty-four Stanford students have been elected Rhodes Scholars since World War II. Nearly eighty percent of graduating seniors attend graduate or professional schools.

About 46 percent of Stanford's undergraduates receive scholarship aid totalling \$9.4 million a year, while almost all of the graduates receive fellowship support valued at \$23 million a year.

Dr. Richard W. Lyman became the seventh President of Stanford in September of 1970 following service as Associate Dean of the School of Humanities and Sciences from 1964 to 1967 and as Vice Provost from 1967 to 1970. He holds the Bachelor of Arts Degree from Swarthmore and the degrees of Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy from Harvard. A specialist in contemporary British history, he joined the Stanford faculty in history in 1958.

Among the approximately 1100 faculty members who make up the Stanford Academic Council, there are eight Nobel laureates, three Pulitzer Prize winners, 62 members of the



National Academy of Sciences, 95 members of the Academy of Arts and Sciences, 24 members of the National Academy of Engineering, seven members of the National Academy of Education and 10 National Medal of Science winners.

A special feature of the Stanford undergraduate education is the opportunity to attend a Stanford overseas study center. These centers enable the students to study abroad while continuing normal progress toward an undergraduate degree. The five Stanford overseas centers are located in England, France, Germany, Austria and Italy. Programs for advanced students conducted with other universities are in Paris, Salamanca (Spain) and Bonn. Yet another program available, located in Rome, is the Intercollegiate Center for Classical Studies. In 1977-78, approximately 600 students spent one, two or three quarters at one of the studies centers.

BRUCE SUMMERHAYS

Head Golf Coach

If experience is the best teacher, as the old axiom says, Stanford's Bruce Summerhays may be one of the nation's leading golf instructors.

Entering his second season as the Cardinals' head coach, the 35-year-old Summerhays has logged many years of invaluable golf experience as a player. Voted the 1977 Northern California Golfer of the Year, the St. Louis native has won five local tournaments in recent years.

Noted as an excellent tutor as well as a quality player, Summerhays captured the Nor-Cal Open in 1974, the Nor-Cal Match Play in '72, '77 and '78 and the Nor-Cal Assistants in '69. He also placed third in the Bing Crosby Pro-Am in 1974, and has played in the U.S. Open four times.

More recently, he has also added an international flavor to his background by playing for the U.S. PGA Cup Team against Britain and Ireland during the past two years.

Additionally, Summerhays qualified for the 1977 PGA Championship played at Pebble Beach with a fifth-place finish in the Club Professionals Championship. His highest finish on the 1977 pro tour came in the \$25,000 Sierra-Nevada Open at the Edgewood Course at South Lake Tahoe, where he took fourth.

Prior to coming to Stanford, Summerhays was the teaching pro at the Ancil Hoffman Golf Course in Carmichael for two years. He began his pro career as the assistant at the Olympic Club in San Francisco in 1966, a position he held for eight years. He then served 18 months as the head pro at the Cameron Park Country Club in Shingle Springs.

Summerhays and his wife Carolyn live in Fremont with their seven children-- Shelly, 13; Bryan, 11; Joseph, 7; William, 5; Rachel, 4; Susanna, 3; and Bruce, Jr., 1. His brother Gary is the golf coach at Sacramento's Del Campo High School

## 1979 MEN'S OUTLOOK

Since 1971, the Cardinals have finished in the Top 20 four times, including a No. 14 showing last year at Eugene, Ore.

Bruce Summerhays, the man who replaced the legendary Bud Finger as Stanford's head coach last season, is predicting another winner on the Farm in 1979.

Much of the Cardinals' fortunes will depend on the continued wizardry of sophomore Doug Clarke. The Southern California Amateur champion in 1977, Clarke was named a third team All-America in his maiden season at Stanford.

"Doug has the ability to become one of the top collegiate golfers in the nation," boasts Summerhays. "He will be a major factor in Stanford golf for the next three years."

Clarke will have a worthy supporting cast, too. Other capable returnees include juniors Steve Schroeder, Jeff Armstrong and Ken Bakst, seniors Bud Ardell, Eduardo Cortez and Kim Cater, and sophomore Eric Morse. Schroeder, perhaps the team's most improved player, finished the 1978 campaign with a flourish. He placed fourth in the Pacific-8 Championships.

"This season should be a fine year for Stanford golf," says Summerhays. "Recruiting was successful and we signed two players who will have an excellent chance to move into the top six spots this year."

That two will consist of David Games (Bellflower) and Jack Skilling (Chevy Chase, Md.). From past record, it would appear that Games is the real thoroughbred. A former Junior America Cup champion and National Junior Tournament runnerup, Games has been rated the best junior in Southern California for the past two years.

"I considered David to be the best recruit in the nation last year," claims Summerhays.

Skilling was no slouch in Maryland either, where he was the state's junior champion and the 1977 Washington, D.C. Junior Player of the Year.

Another freshman, Neil Robinson of Newhall, has also emerged as a starting candidate after some splendid rounds this fall.

All in all, the Cards look set for the future. But whether these three freshmen can negate the loss of graduated senior Mike Peck is still uncertain. Peck, a three-time NCAA All-America, was the Cards' big breadwinner for three seasons. He undoubtedly leaves a gaping hole to fill.

The Pac-10 Conference will once again be one of the country's premier circuits with USC, UCLA, Oregon and both Arizona schools fielding high-caliber teams.

But Summerhays, a man who exudes confidence, believes that his youngsters are ready to contribute now to a nationally-ranked Cardinal squad.

"We are young on paper," admits the Stanford coach, "but we're experienced in tournament play, which should bring some consistency to our tournament scores in the coming season."

Whether that "consistency" will make the Cardinals a legitimate NCAA title contender in 1979 remains to be seen. The final verdict will unfold at the national tournament in May to be played at Wake Forest University in Winston-Salem, N.C.

## U. S. COLLEGIATE INVITATIONAL

In its 11 years of existence, the Stanford U.S. Collegiate Invitational Golf Tournament has grown to become one of the most outstanding intercollegiate championships in the West. The 12th U.S. Collegiate Invitational will be held this season from April 19-21 on the Stanford Golf Course.

UCLA's Chuck White carded a record-setting 210 in last year's three-round tourney, shooting scores of 71, 68 and 71. The previous individual low was 212, which was set by two former Stanford players--Tom Watson in 1971 and Mike Peck in 1976.

San Diego State claimed the team title for the second straight year, out-scoring runnerup UCLA by an 882-885 margin. Stanford has won seven of the 11 team championships, including a six-year string from 1970-75. Five Cardinals have won or shared the individual crown.

### PACIFIC-10 SOUTHERN DIVISION

Coach Bruce Summerhays' Cardinals will compete again this season in the Pacific-10 Southern Division Championships, April 30-May 1, in Phoenix, Ariz. It marks the first time that both Southwest schools--Arizona and Arizona State--will participate in the conference tournament. Last year, the Cardinals let a 13-stroke lead slip away in the final nine holes as USC edged Stanford, 1185-1191. However, Stanford's Mike Peck tied Brent Murray of Oregon for top individual honors with a four-round total of 286. Other high finishers included USC's Larry Collins (292), Stanford's Steve Schroeder (283) and USC's Jim Williams (295).

## 1979 WOMEN'S OUTLOOK

There's an accent on youth for the 1979 Stanford women's golf team. Coach Bruce Summerhays has landed three high school gems in Barbara Wright, Debbie Barberio and Suzie Rielly. All three freshmen should pierce Stanford's top five before the season's end.

Add those gifted youngsters to such experienced golfers as All-America Sally Voss, Marin JC transfer Linda Bowman, Allison Finney and Patty Pichon, and 1979 could be a very good year for the Cardinals.

"The outlook for Stanford women's golf is so much better than last year," beams second-year coach Summerhays. "These girls are very dedicated towards their team goal."

For Stanford, which has visited the national championships on several occasions, its primary goal is to once again gain entrance into the AIAW Nationals. The Cards, who suffered through a rocky season last year, were shut out from post-season play as the AIAW limits its tournament to the top 25 schools.

Nevertheless, Stanford did have one highlight in last year's AIAW event, as Voss carded a four-round total of 302 to place seventh in the individual standings. Voss, who will apparently bypass a future PGA career to enter the medicine field, is certainly one of college's best female golfers. The Bethesda, Md. senior has been voted to the All Nor-Cal Conference Team three years in a row, and she also played in the 1977 U.S. Women's Open.

"Sally has really worked hard on her game," says Summerhays. "She's improved her swing immensely. She is truly one of the nation's premier women golfers."

Besides Voss, the Cards also feature sophomore Bowman, a Marin College transfer who won the 1976 and 1977 Nor-Cal Junior Golf Association titles. And junior Finney and sophomore Pichon will also provide experience for Stanford.

But the nucleus for the future is comprised of the aforementioned freshmen. Wright, who hails from San Diego, has qualified for the Junior World Tournament in 1975-77. Barberio, another San Diego product (Oceanside), has been a dominant force on the California Junior Golf scene. And Reilly was considered another blue-chipper from Southern California, where she was the 1977 runnerup in the Southland PGA Junior tournament while at La Canada High.

According to Summerhays, all three golfers could play as high as No. 3 this year.

"They really bring a lot of enthusiasm to the team," he adds. "They also give us seven good golfers now, which provides strong competition for the top five spots."

Another returning player who may emerge in 1979 is junior Nola Miyasaki. The Honolulu, Hi. native has shown vast improvement during the off-season.

"People like Miyasaki and Finney have improved five to six strokes from last year," claims the Cards' coach.

Once again, the Nor-Cal championship will be determined by a series of one-round tournaments alternated among the five league sites. The Stanford Golf Course will be the site for the second round Mar. 6.

San Jose State's Spartans are undoubtedly the conference favorite.

"The Spartans must be considered one of the best teams in the country," admits Summerhays. "But, I think we can challenge them."
