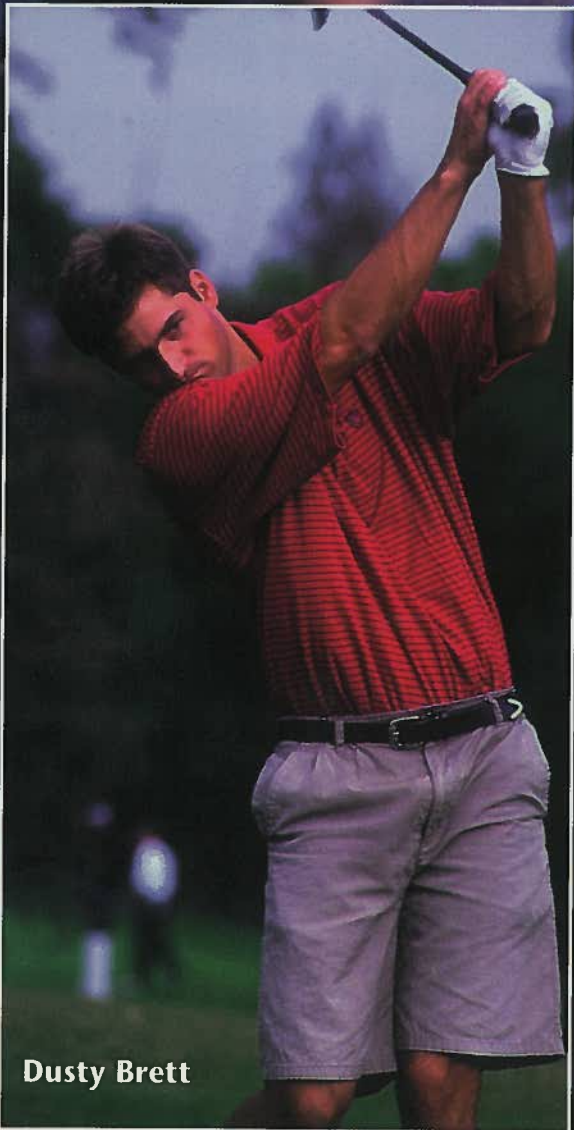

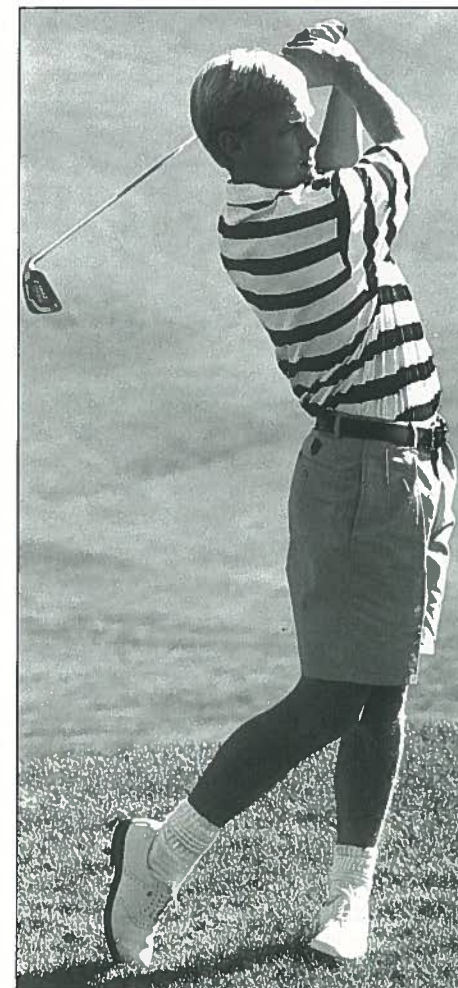

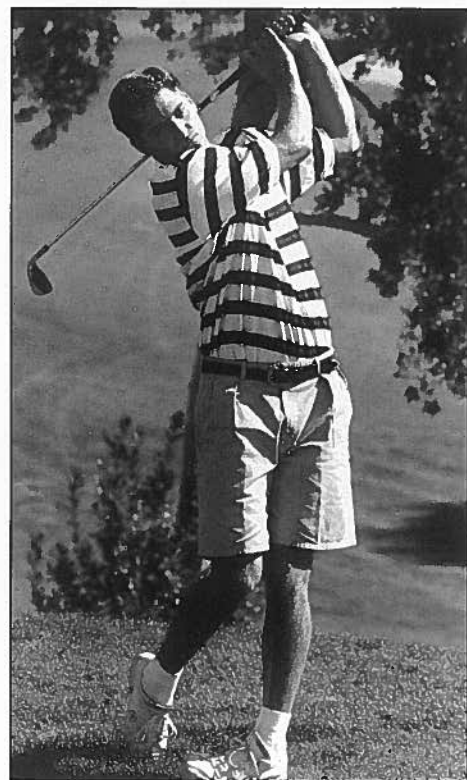


Joel Kribel returns from an All-American campaign to lead the Cardinal into the 1997-98 season. Photo USGA/John Mummert

The 1997-98 Stanford men's golf team is short on experience but not on talent. Stanford returns only two letterwinners, but adds six freshman with a tremendous amount of potential.

"I have great enthusiasm," said Stanford head coach Wally Goodwin. "I think the team has possibilities."

Goodwin will look to junior Joel Kribel to lead the Cardinal at the number one position. Kribel enters the season ranked fourth in the nation by

the MasterCard Collegiate Golf poll. He had an outstanding summer of golf, playing in the finals of the U.S. Amateur. He also participated in the Walker Cup and Palmer Cup matches while qualifying for the U.S. Open and Western Open.

"Joel had another wonderful summer," said Stanford head coach Wally Goodwin. "His results are a tribute to his dedication and his level headedness in terms of being able to cope with the ups and downs of college golf."

Kribel earned first team All-American honors in 1996-97 after recording nine top 10 and 10 top 25 finishes. He won Stanford's U.S. Intercollegiate with a season-low 208, including a season-low 66 in the third round. He also finished first at the Western Intercollegiate in Santa Cruz while capturing the individual title in a playoff at the International Intercollegiate in Monterrey, Mexico.

"Joel is a blue collared, hard working young man," said Goodwin. He has a great future in the game of golf."

Dusty Brett returns for his sophomore season on The Farm. He was a semifinalist at the Pacific Northwest Men's Amateur Championship last summer and finished ninth at the Washington State Men's Amateur Championship. Brett finished the 1996-97 season with a 74.42 stroke average, the team's third best, while recording two top 20 and seven top 25 finishes. He tied for third with a career-best 212 at Utah's Cougar Classic while finishing sixth at the Sacramento State Invitational and 18th at the Pac-10 Championships.

"Dusty has come back to school even bigger, stronger and more aggressive," said Goodwin.

"He's going to be a huge force this year and as time goes along. I'm sure that by the time he finishes his career at Stanford, he'll be an All-American."

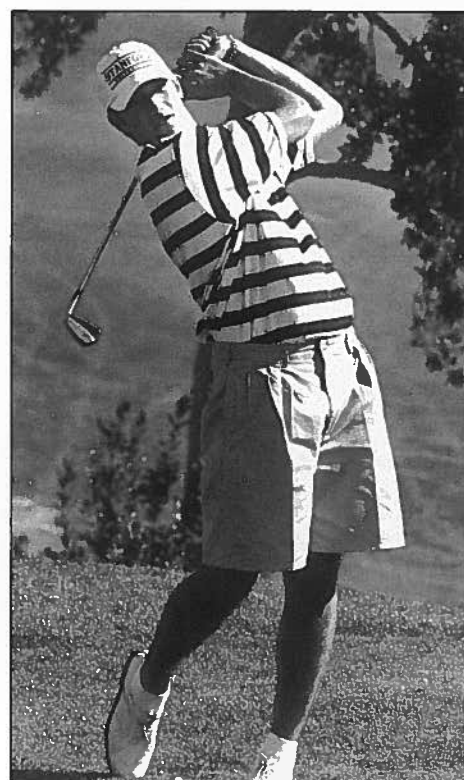
Goodwin looks to freshmen Jimmy Lee and Alex Aragon to contribute immediately. Lee, out of Coral Springs, Florida, is a two-time *Miami Herald/Sun Sentinel* Player of the Year. Aragon was the San Diego Player of the Year. Lee and Aragon should see playing time early in the season.

"I think when I finally give the freshmen a chance to qualify, they are going to go in there and bump some guys around," said Goodwin. "Jimmy and Alex have the background to do the job."

David Searle is a junior transfer from San Jose State. He played one year of golf for the Spartans, earning 1996 Big West All-Academic recognition. Sophomore Andy Hastings should also see playing time. He made a great deal of improvement over the course of his freshman season and is expected to compete for a spot in the lineup.

"Both young men have the potential to be a force on the team," said Goodwin. "David is a brilliant youngster with a good junior record. Andy played some good golf this summer and should be scoring much more consistently."

Senior captain Eri Crum adds valuable leadership to a young squad. Crum competed in eight tournaments last season while earning second team Pac-10 All-Academic recognition. He

carded a season-best 228 at the Red River Classic in Dallas, including a season-low 73 in the final round.

"Eri has shown that he will be one of our best captains ever," said Goodwin. "He is very loyal and adds a lot of excitement to the team."

Also competing for playing time will be junior Tyler Dennis, sophomore Tylar Lunke and freshmen John Anderson, Rudy Barreto, Eric Dahlberg and Seth Wang.

"I look forward to seeing how the team plays," said Goodwin. "Because of their age they will make more progress than probably any other group that I've had here."

Stanford looks to return to the NCAA Championships after failing to qualify last season. Goodwin's squad has the potential to contend in the Pac-10 conference and make an appearance at the NCAAs, played at the Championship Golf Course in Albuquerque, N.M.

"I think that there is enough talent in the group. They have a great chance of making the NCAA finals," said Goodwin. "I'm really looking forward to the year."

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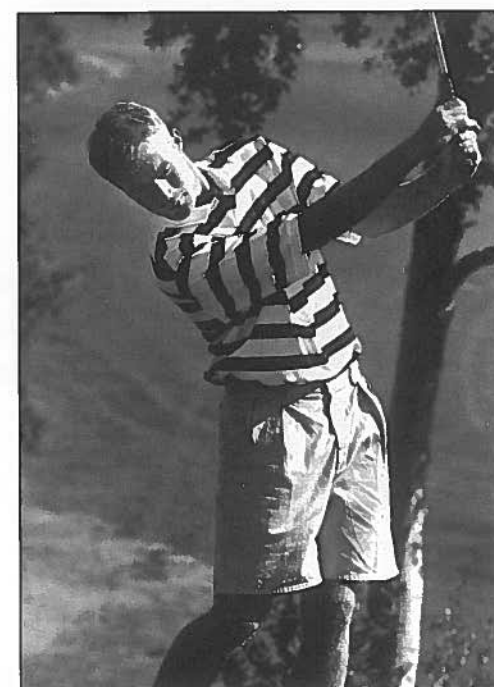

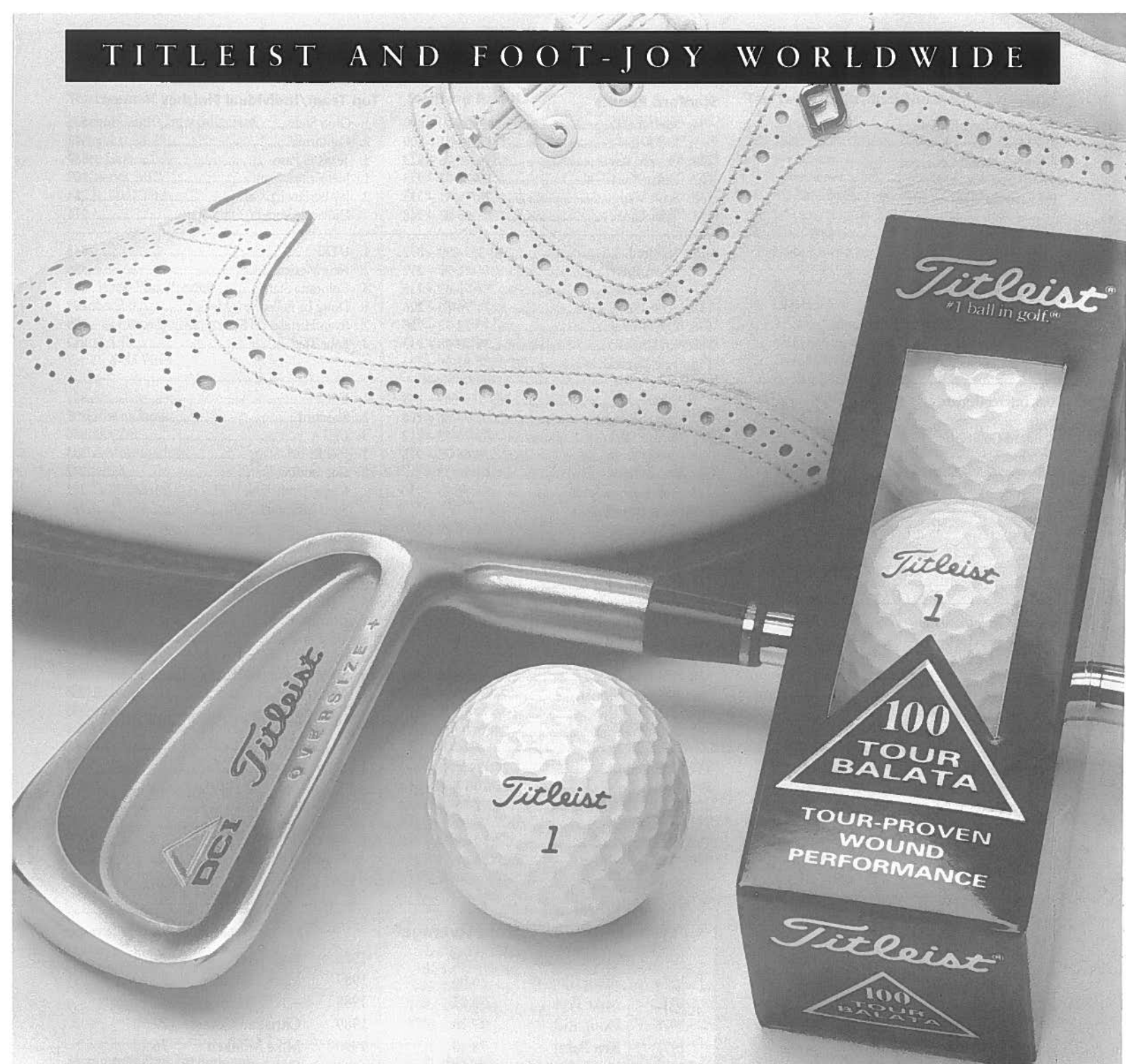

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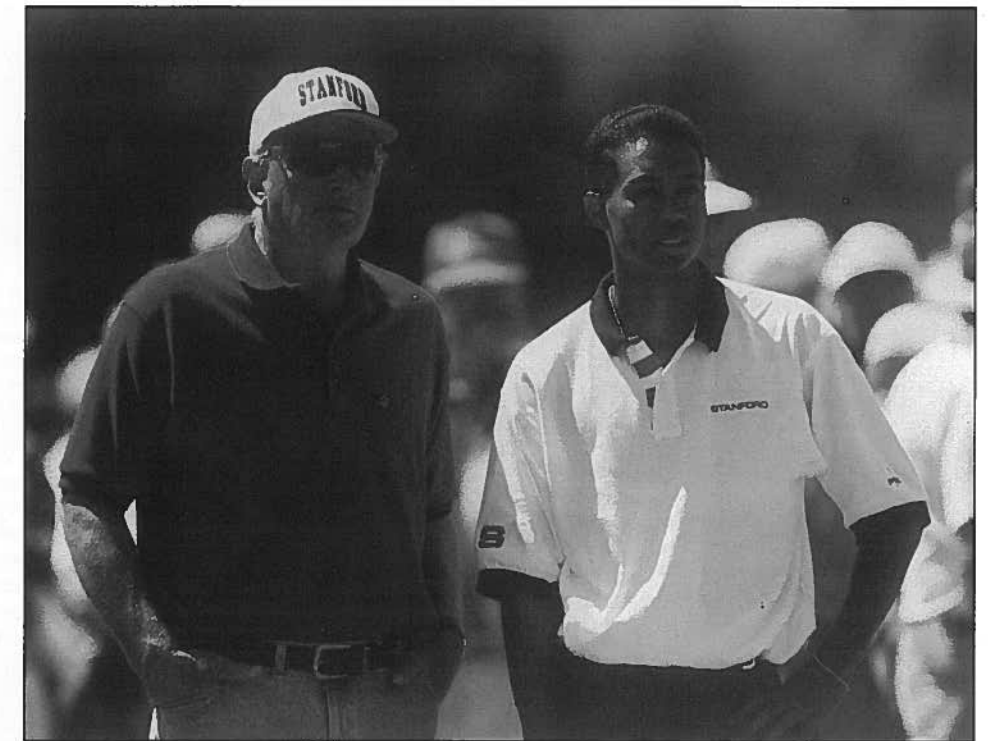
Wally Goodwin

Men's Golf Coach



Wally Goodwin is entering his 11th season as Stanford head men's golf coach. In his 10 seasons on The Farm he has produced some of the greatest teams and individual golfers in Stanford history.

Goodwin coached the most decorated golfer in the history of Stanford, Tiger Woods. While at Stanford, Woods captured 10 individual tournament titles, including the 1996 NCAA individual championship. Goodwin's 1994 team became the seventh NCAA men's golf championship team in school history when they captured the title for the first time in over forty years. The

In the past four years, his Stanford team has won an NCAA title (1994) and finished second in a playoff (1995), and Tiger Woods captured the individual title (1996)

1995 team recorded a second-place finish at the NCAA tournament.

Goodwin's list of accomplishments is highlighted by a 1994 NCAA Coach of the Year honor. He was also named 1992 and 1995 Pac-10 Coach of the Year. In addition, he has coached two Pac-10 Championship teams, three individual conference champions and seven All-Americans, including 1997 first team selection Joel Kribel.

Goodwin's coaching experience spans throughout college and high school athletics. Before Goodwin's stint on the farm, he spent six years as the head men's golf coach at Northwestern in Evanston, IL. Goodwin coached All-American Jim Benepe, PGA tour player Fran Quinn and Asian Tour

player Don Boulet. Goodwin's involvement in high school athletics began at Fountain Valley High School in Colorado Springs where he served as head football and basketball coach as well as assistant director of athletics for four years. He then served as head football and basketball coach at Western Reserve Academy. Three years later, Goodwin relocated to Pebble Beach to become the athletic director, basketball coach and golf coach at Robert Louis Stevenson High School.

Goodwin graduated from Pomfret High School in Pomfret, Connecticut. He was honorably discharged from the military in August of 1946 after serving in World War II. He then returned to school at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville where he earned a bachelor of science degree in physical education in 1951.

Wally and his wife, the former Nancy Lane Booth, have been married just over 40 years. They have two sons, Putter and Reamy.

Stanford's Scholarship Funding

Two sources provide scholarship funds for Stanford's student-athletes: the Athletic Department's scholarship endowment and the Buck/Cardinal Athletic Scholarship Fund. Together they provide over \$6 million in financial aid.

Endowed Scholarships

Endowed scholarships are large sums of money that have been invested in the University's endowment and generate significant interest income each year. A portion of the income is spent on student aid and the remainder is reinvested in the principal.

The following endowed scholarships, named for the donor or for someone the donor wishes to honor, provide full or partial grants-in-aid to members of the 1997-98 men's golf team:

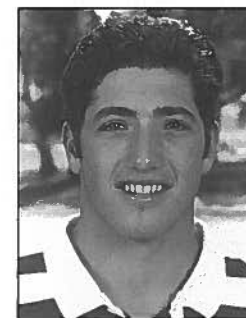

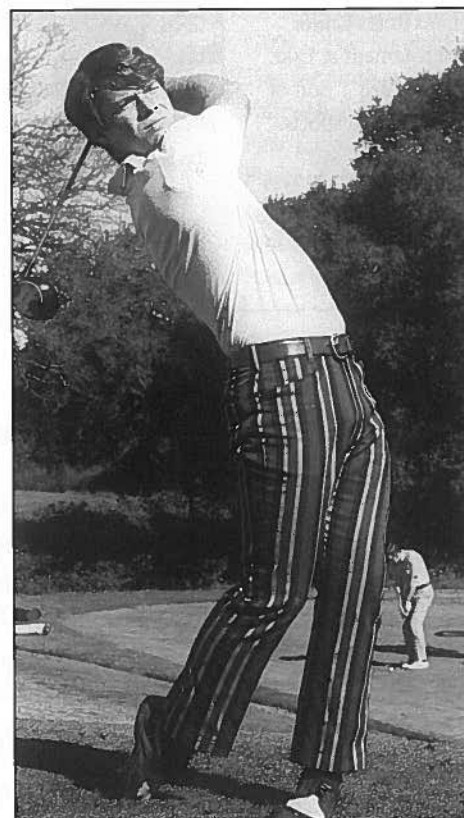

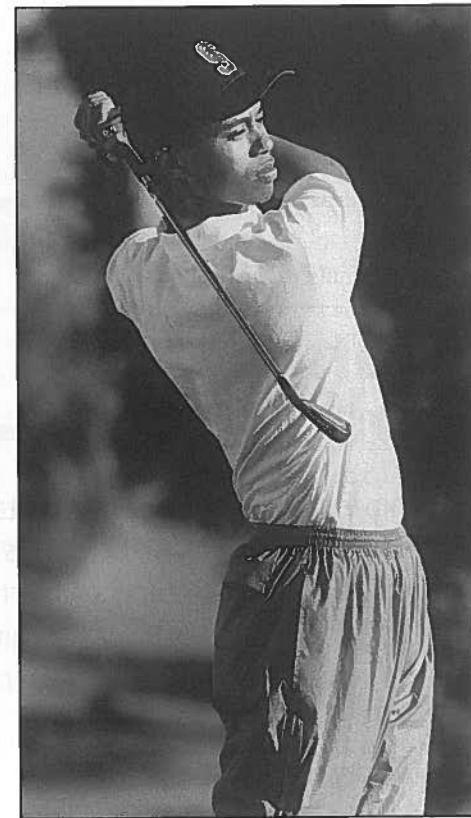

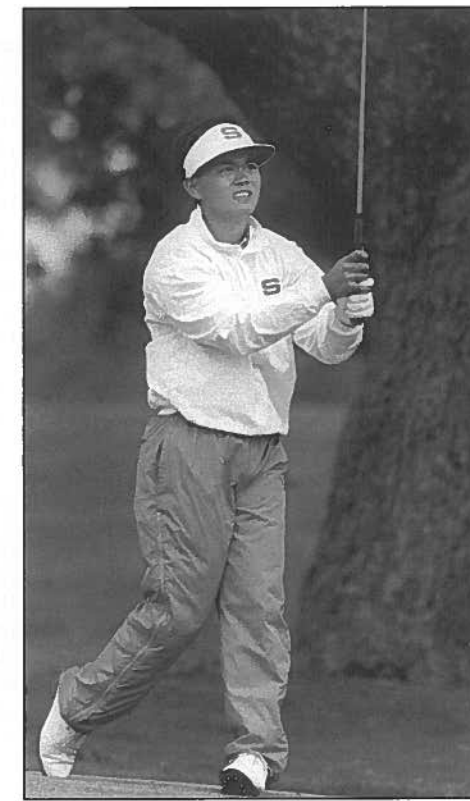

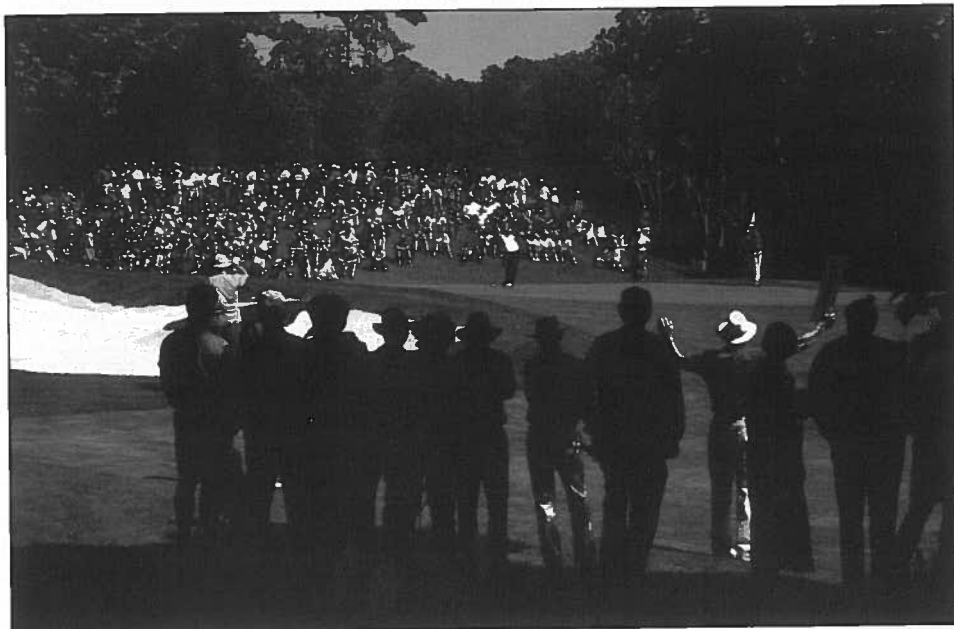

In the 1920's the Stanford students lobbied for a golf course. The golf team was using the Burlingame course for practice and was coached by the Burlingame pro Harold Sampson. Luckily they found an enthusiast in Almon E. Roth '09, the University Controller, who had become hooked on the game and was a member of the



Los Altos Country Club. In February 1929, he persuaded the Stanford University Board of Trustees to provide the land and finance the construction. Then he gave instructions to Al Masters the manager of the Athletic Department to hire George C. Thomas Jr. and William "Billy" Bill to design and build the course.

Roth had his own ideas as to the layout of the course. When Bell arrived in March they walked the area. Bell immediately saw the possibility of incorporating San Francisquito Creek into the design. To get the land on the other side of the creek, which belonged to the Buck Estate, required a change in the California State Constitution to permit a land swap. Roth flew to Sacramento from the Palo Alto airport in an open cockpit biplane to lobby for the change.

Construction started in May 1929 with great care to preserve the oak trees. Only 75 were removed. At that time water from the irrigation of campus came from Searsville Lake. A lot more water would be required for the golf course so Felt Lake was enlarged to a capacity of 278,000,000 gallons. By December the course was ready. It opened on January 1, 1930. "Dick" Templeton the track coach, who first used starting blocks in track meets, was in the first four-some.

Thomas designed the course and Bell managed the construction. Bell traveled back and forth to Beverly Hills updating Thomas on his

progress and getting further instructions. Thomas was ill and died a couple of years later having never seen the results of his effort. A very unique feature of the course was Bell's bunker design. It was very natural with edges that were not well defined.

The course cost \$188,000 and enlarging Felt Lake was \$190,000. The club house, which cost \$54,000, was designed by the architects Bakewell and Brown who had designed many buildings on campus and were noted for having done City Hall in San Francisco. Wells P. Goodenough, a club member was the contractor.

In 1930 the course was ranked in the top 15 by Dr. H. J. Morlan who had played over 800 golf courses in the world. Not too long ago it was still ranked among the top 100. The 12th hole is one of the most difficult in Northern California, having four trees down the middle of the fairway. The 18th tee is probably the most picturesque because of the spectacular view of San Francisco and almost the entire Bay Area.

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Stanford Athletics: Home of Champions

NCAA's Champion of Champions

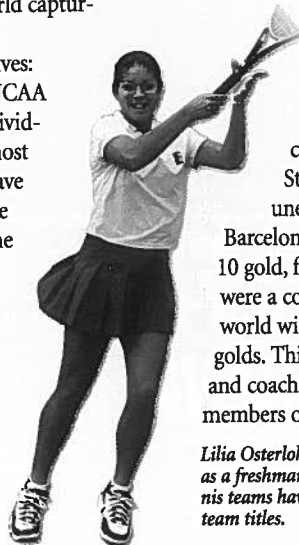


Stanford's women's basketball team has played in the NCAA Final Four on six occasions, winning twice. Cross country won both men's and women's titles in 1996. Football has played in four bowl games in the past six years. Women's volleyball has won three NCAA titles in the past five years. Men's basketball has advanced to postseason play in all but one season since 1987, advancing to the Sweet Sixteen in 1996-97.

"Home of Champions." Those are the bywords for the Stanford University Athletic Department

And for good reason. No athletic department in the country can boast of the kind of success that Stanford has accomplished since the 1980's. NCAA team championships. NCAA individual champions. Olympic medalists. Stanford University athletes have been all over the world capturing championships.

The statistics speak for themselves: Stanford University has won 53 NCAA team championships and 197 individual NCAA titles since 1980, the most in the nation; Cardinal athletes have won 44 NCAA championships the past 12 years (1985-97) - again the most in the nation. A year ago, Stanford won an unprecedented six NCAA team championships, the most ever by one school in an academic year. In 1991-92, Stanford athletes took home 29 individual NCAA titles - an NCAA record. Cardinal athletes won 21 individual

championships during the 1992-93 season, the second most in history.

For the past three years, Stanford has won the Sears Directors' Cup - emblematic of the nation's top athletic program.

All totaled, Stanford has won 77 collegiate team titles (70 NCAA championships) and 295 NCAA individual titles.

Cardinal women have won an NCAA-best 22 team championships.

In Olympic competition,

Stanford has enjoyed unequalled success. At the 1992 Games in Barcelona, Cardinal athletes earned 19 medals, 10 gold, four silver and five bronze. If Stanford were a country, it would've placed 13th in the world with its 19 medals and ninth with 10 golds. Thirty-eight Stanford-affiliated athletes and coaches participated in Barcelona while 41 members of the Cardinal family took part in the

No athletic department in the country can boast of the kind of success that Stanford has accomplished.

What did Tiger Woods do to follow up his NCAA golf title? He became the youngest winner of the Masters and the quickest golfer to attain over \$1 million in career earnings.

1988 Olympic Games in Seoul, Korea.

At the 1996 Games in Atlanta, Stanford again placed 49 coaches and athletes on Olympic Teams, including three head United States Olympic coaches (Tara VanDerveer, women's basketball; Richard Quick, women's swimming; Skip Kenney, men's swimming). Stanford athletes accounted for 16 gold medals, one silver and one bronze in Atlanta.

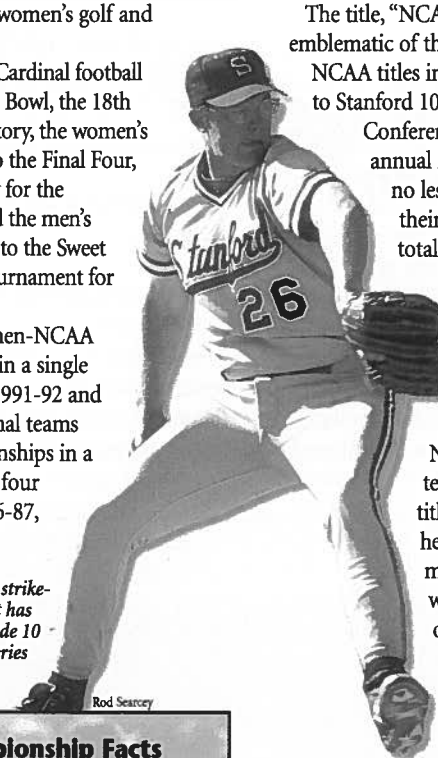
NCAA titles have become quite commonplace in the Stanford Athletic Department. In 1996-97, Cardinal teams took home NCAA championships in men's and women's cross country, men's and women's volleyball and men's and women's tennis. Nine other teams finished in the top-four nationally, including second place finishes in women's swimming, men's swimming, men's water polo and women's synchronized swimming, third place finishes in women's basketball, baseball and fencing, and

fourth place finishes in women's golf and women's water polo.

1996-97 also saw the Cardinal football team advance to the Sun Bowl, the 18th bowl game in school history, the women's basketball team return to the Final Four, the baseball team qualify for the College World Series and the men's basketball team advance to the Sweet Sixteen of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1942.

Stanford has won a then-NCAA record five NCAA titles in a single year on two occasions: 1991-92 and again in 1994-95. Cardinal teams have won four championships in a single academic year on four occasions: 1985-86, 1986-87, 1992-93 and 1993-94.

Kyle Peterson is the all-time strike-out leader in a program that has won 15 conference titles, made 10 trips to the College World Series and won two NCAA titles.

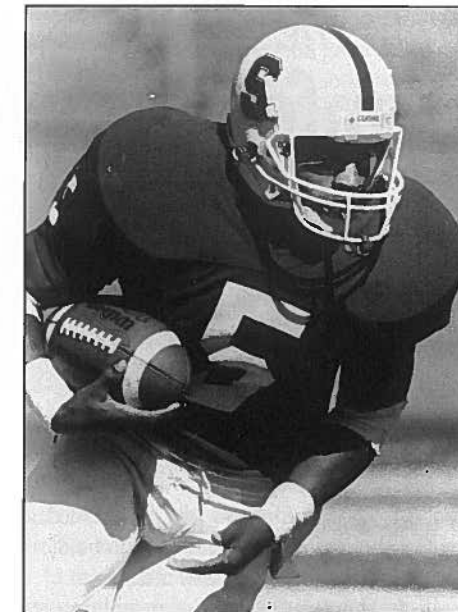
The title, "NCAA Champion of Champions," emblematic of the school that wins the most NCAA titles in a single season, has been given to Stanford 10 times in the last 12 years.

Conference championships are also an annual ritual on The Farm. Last season, no less than 16 Stanford teams won their conference title, bringing the total to 60 in the last five years and 69 in the past six seasons.

Stanford has simply dominated in several sports. Under head coach Dick Gould, the Cardinal men's tennis team has won 15 NCAA titles while the women's team has hauled in 10 national titles, all but one under current head coach Frank Brennan. The men's swimming program has won seven NCAA team championships, six under current head coach Skip Kenney while the men's water polo team has captured eight national titles, seven under current head coach Dante Dettamanti.

The Cardinal women's swimming team has won eight national titles, six under current head coach Richard Quick. Both Quick and Kenney were head coaches of the 1996 United States Olympic Swimming Teams. Tara VanDerveer, the 1996 United States Olympic Head Women's Basketball Coach, has led the Cardinal to two NCAA championships and five appearances in the Final Four.

Baseball coach Mark Marquess, who was the head coach of the gold medal winning 1988 United States Olympic baseball team, led the Cardinal to back-to-back College World Series titles in 1987 and '88. Men's gymnastics coach Sadao Hamada has led the Cardinal to three

NCAA championships in the last six years, women's volleyball coach Don Shaw has guided his team to three NCAA titles and men's golf coach Wally Goodwin led his team to the NCAA title in 1994, the first men's golf title at Stanford since 1953. Vin Lananna joined the championship parade in 1996 by leading both his men's and women's cross country teams to national titles.

Olympic gold medalists are numerous on The Farm. Former Cardinal standout Bob Mathias won back-to-back Olympic decathlon gold medals in 1948 and '52 while swimmers Pablo Morales, Summer Sanders and Janet Evans have become household names in the swimming world.

Morales, who helped Stanford win three straight NCAA team championships (1985-87), won three medals at the '84 Games in Los Angeles (one gold, two silver) and two more gold medals at the '92 Games in Barcelona. Evans won three golds in the '88 Games in Seoul and one gold and one silver in Barcelona while Sanders won four medals in Barcelona, two gold, one silver and one bronze.

Some of the great student-athletes in Stanford history include Tiger Woods and Tom Watson (golf), John McEnroe (tennis), Kim Oden (volleyball), Jack McDowell and Mike Mussina (baseball), Hank Luisetti (men's basketball), Jennifer Azzi (women's basketball), Jim Plunkett and John Elway (football), Pablo Morales, Summer Sanders and Jenny Thompson (swimming), Debi Thomas (figure skating), Eric Heiden (speed skating) and the great Ernie Nevers (football), to name a few.

It's no wonder Stanford University is often referred to as the "NCAA's Champion of Champions."

Stanford at a Glance

On October 1, 1891, the 465 new students who were on hand for opening day ceremonies at Leland Stanford Junior University greeted Leland and Jane Stanford enthusiastically, with a chant they had made up and rehearsed only that morning. Wah-hoo! Wah-hoo! L-S-J-U! Stanford! Its wild and spirited tone symbolized the excitement of this bold adventure. As a pioneer faculty member recalled, "Hope was in every heart, and the presiding spirit of freedom prompted us to dare greatly."

For the Stanfords on that day, the university was the realization of a dream and a fitting tribute to the memory of their only son, who had died of typhoid fever weeks before his sixteenth birthday. Far from the nation's center of culture and unencumbered by tradition or ivy, the new university drew students from all over the country: many from California; some who followed professors hired from other colleges and universities; and some simply seeking adventure in the West. Though there were many difficulties during the first months — housing was inadequate, microscopes and books were late in arriving from the East — the first year foretold greatness. As Jane Stanford wrote in the summer of 1892, "Even our fondest hopes have been realized."

Ideas of "Practical Education"

Governor and Mrs. Stanford had come from families of modest means and had built their way up through a life of hard work. So it was

natural that their first thoughts were to establish an institution where young men and women could "grapple successfully with the practicalities of life." As their thoughts matured, these ideas of "practical education" enlarged to the concept of producing cultured

and useful citizens who were well-prepared for professional success.

More than one hundred years later, the university still enjoys the original 8,180 acres (almost 13 square miles) of grassy fields, eucalyptus groves, and rolling hills that were the

Stanfords' generous legacy, as well as the Quadrangle of "long corridors with their state-ly pillars" at the center of campus. It is still true, as the philosopher William James said, during his stint as a visiting professor, that the climate is "so friendly ... that every morning wakes one fresh for new amounts of work."

Current Perspectives

In other ways, the University has changed tremendously on its way to recognition as one of the world's great universities. At the hub of a vital and diverse Bay Area, Stanford is an hour's drive south of San Francisco and just a few miles north of the Silicon Valley, an area dotted with computer and high technology firms largely spawned by the University's faculty and graduates. On campus, students and faculty enjoy new libraries, modern laboratories, sports facilities, and comfortable residences. Contemporary sculpture, as well as pieces from the Stanford Museum's extensive collection of sculpture by Auguste Rodin, is placed throughout the campus, providing unexpected pleasures at many turns. At the Stanford Medical Center, world-renowned for its research, teaching, and patient care,

scientists and physicians are searching for answers to fundamental questions about health and disease. Ninety miles down the coast, at Stanford's Hopkins Marine Station on the Monterey Bay, scientists are working to better understand the mechanisms of evolution, human development, and ecological systems.

The University is organized into seven schools: Earth Sciences, Education, Engineering, the Graduate School of Business, Humanities and Sciences, Law and Medicine. In addition, there are more than 30 interdisciplinary centers, programs, and research laboratories — including the Hoover Institution on War, Revolution and Peace; the Institute for International Studies; the Stanford Linear Accelerator Center; and the Stanford Center for the Study of Families, Children and Youth — where faculty from a wide

range of fields bring different perspectives to bear on issues and problems. Stanford's Overseas Studies Program offers students in all fields remarkable opportunities for study abroad, with campuses in Paris, Kyoto, Santiago, Berlin, Oxford, Krakow, Florence, and Rome.

Stanford People

By any measure, Stanford's faculty — which numbers approximately 1,300 — is one of the most distinguished in the nation. It includes 12 Nobel laureates, 6 Pulitzer Prize winners, 19 National Medal of Science winners, 92 members of the National Academy of Arts and Sciences, 61 members of the National Academy of Engineering, and 18 members of the National Academy of Education. Yet beyond

their array of honors, what truly distinguishes Stanford faculty is their commitment to sharing knowledge with their students. The great majority of professors teach undergraduates both in introductory lecture classes and in small advanced seminars. Currently 13,900 students, of which 6,500 are undergraduates, live and study on campus. About 45 percent come from California, but all 50 states and approximately 100 countries are represented as well. Among undergraduates, 42 percent are African American, Asian American, Hispanic or Native American. Like the faculty, the Stanford student body is distinguished. Approximately eight students apply to Stanford for every place in the freshman class. Seventy-one Stanford students have been named Rhodes Scholars and 39 have been named Marshall Scholars. Nearly 90 percent of gradu-

activities, such as tutoring programs for children in nearby East Palo Alto, the Hunger Project, and the Arbor Free Clinic.

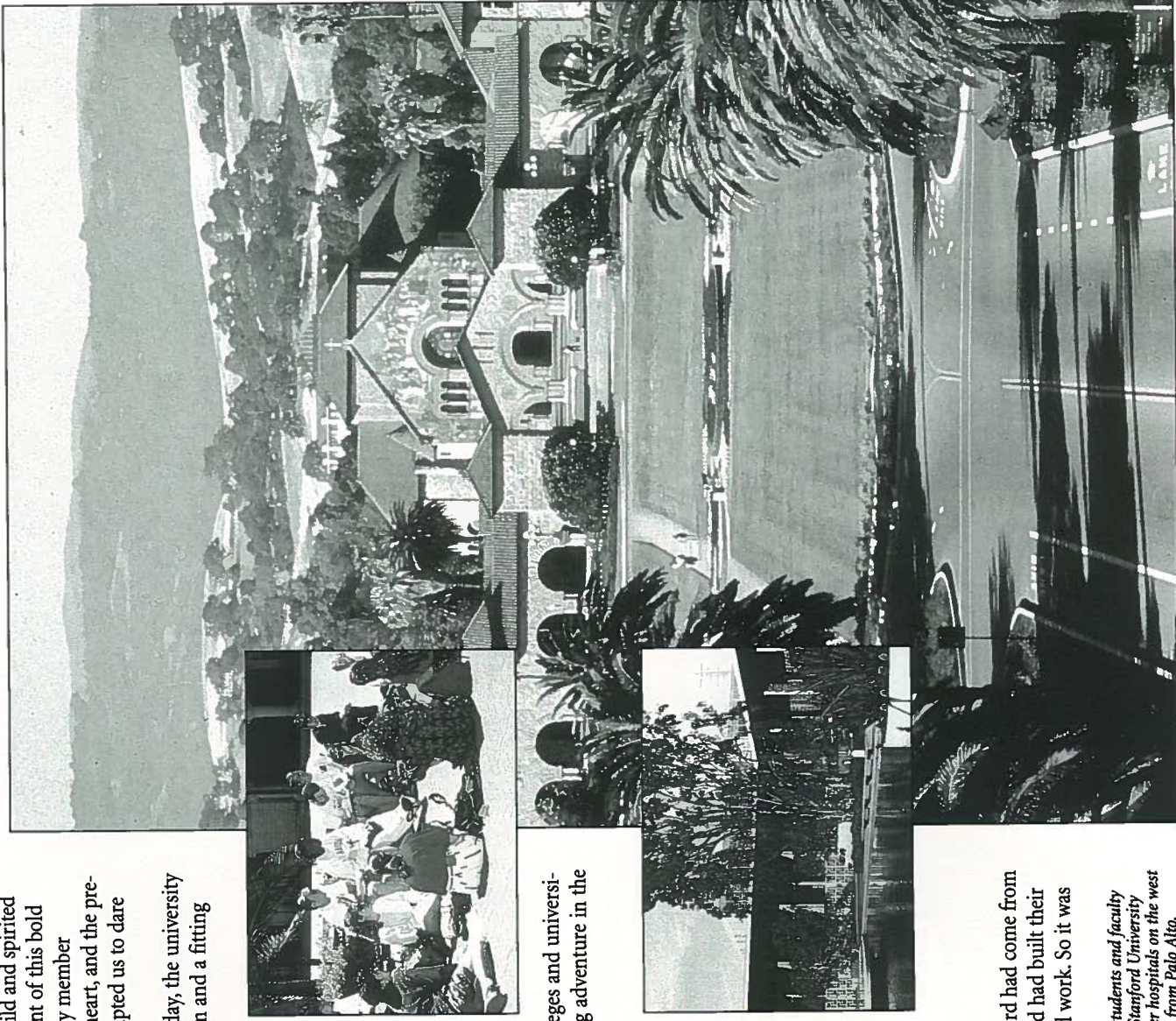
In the athletic arena, Stanford students have enjoyed tremendous success as well. Stanford fields teams in 33 Division I varsity sports — equally divided between men's and women's teams. Of Stanford's 78 national team titles, 44 have been captured since 1985, by far the most in the nation. Thirty-eight of Stanford's athletes and coaches participated in the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona while a similar number competed in Atlanta at the 1996 Olympic Games.

Intramural and club sports are also popular; over 1,000 students take part in the club sports program, while participation in the intramural program has reached 13,000, with many students active in more than one sport.

Looking Ahead

In her address to the Board of Trustees, in 1904, Jane Stanford said, "... Let us not be afraid to outgrow old thoughts and ways, and dare to think on new lines as to the future of the work under our care." Her thoughts echo in the words of current Stanford President Gerhard Casper, who has said, "The true university must reinvent itself every day.... At Stanford, these are days of such reconsideration and fresh support for our fundamental tasks — teaching, learning, and research."
