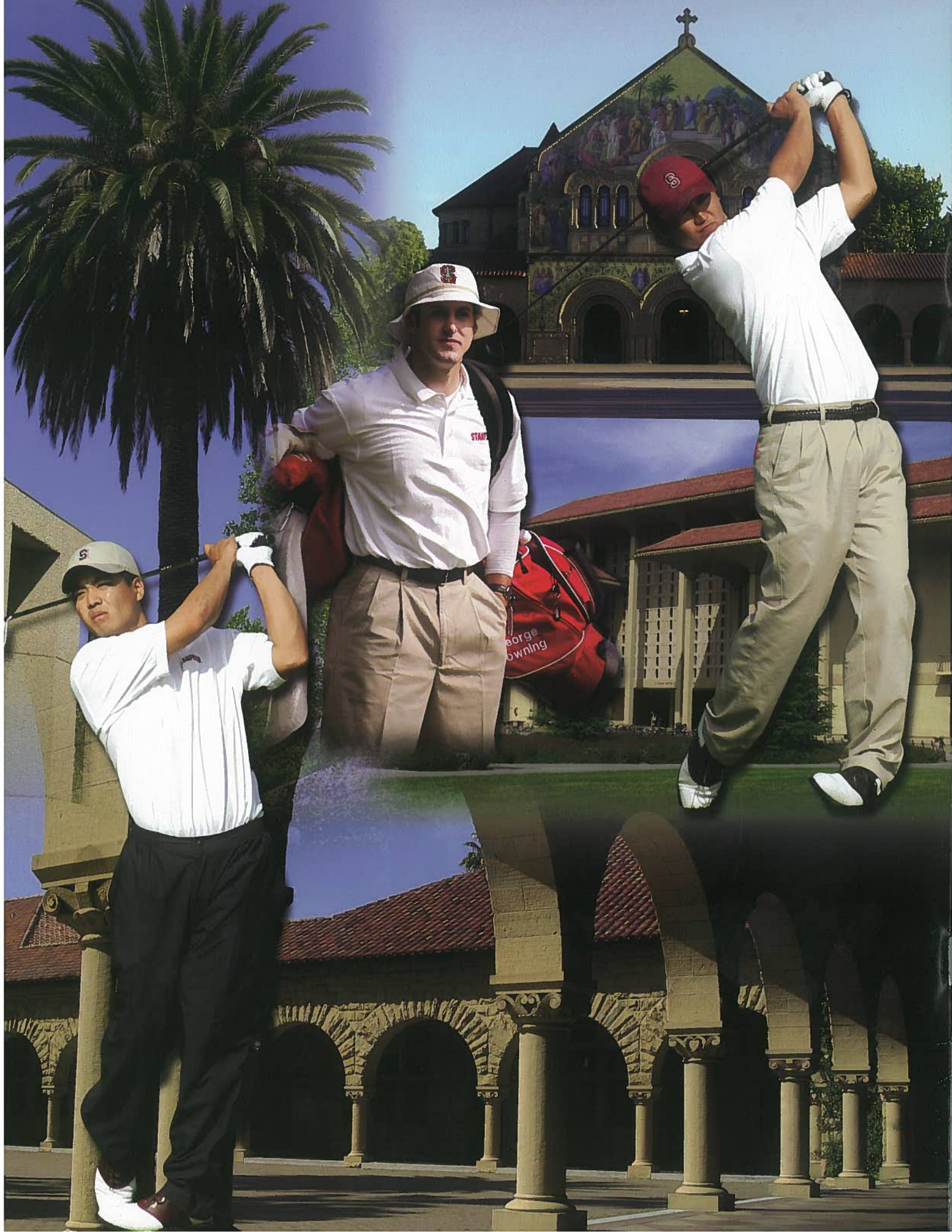

Strong Leadership Will Carry the Cardinal

The Stanford Men's Golf Team will be lead by four talented seniors

"With some strong leadership, we can accomplish a lot. Playing well in the NCAA Regional and National Championships is a matter of wanting it more than others and having the upper classmen pave the way. Their experience and goals will make the difference."

Head Coach Jeff Mitchell.

The 2002-03 Stanford men's golf team is expecting great things from a bevy of talented returnees for the upcoming season. Third-year head coach Jeff Mitchell has four seniors on the roster that should provide leadership and experience to an otherwise youthful squad. The Cardinal have their sights set on postseason competition in 2003 including the NCAA Regional and Championships.

"With some strong leadership, we can accomplish a lot. Playing well in the NCAA Regional and National Championships is a matter of wanting it more than others and having the upper classmen pave the way. Their experience and goals will make the difference," says Mitchell.

Several upperclassmen will anchor the team this season including Jim Seki (Honolulu, HI) and Ron Won (Irvine, CA).

Seki, the 2002 Pacific-10 Individual Champion, competed in all 12 events in 2001-02 with three top 10 finishes. His 73.2 stroke average was second lowest on the team as well. Seki tied for fourth at the Nelson Invitational in the fall, carding a three-round total of 209 and tied for seventh at the ASU Thunderbird/ Savane Invitational in the spring, shooting a 208. He totaled five top 25 finishes last season. This fall, Seki has posted four top 10 finishes, including a tie for second at the Windon Memorial Classic to open the season. He had team-leading 70.4 stroke average through 12 rounds.

"Jim is one of the most talented players in the country. His work ethic is great and his attitude is equal to the task."

Won, participated in eight events during the 2001-02 season, posting a 74.1 stroke average. He notched two top-25 finishes including a third place showing at the Fresno State Lexus Classic where he carded a three-round total of 210. This fall Won was second on the squad with his 72.7 stroke average while notching four top-25 finishes in five events. His top finish was a tie for 12th at the Alister MacKenzie Invitational where he fired a three-round total of

"We have been fortunate to have Ron with us. He is one of the more determined young men around."

Look for junior Blake Mastalir (Englewood, CO) to factor into the Cardinal's success this season as well. Mastalir competed in all 12 events for Stanford during the 2001-02 campaign with seven top 25 finishes, including a tie for 11th at both the Pac-10 Championships and the Oregon Duck Invitational. He had the third-best stroke average on the team with a 73.3.

"Blake was an Academic All-Scholar athlete last year and played well. That is a strong combination."

Sophomore Kevin Blue (Don Mills, Ontario, Canada), who had a solid freshman campaign, will look to build upon that success this year. Blue competed in 10 events during 2001-02 with a 73.4 stroke average (fourth lowest on the squad). His best finish was a tie for 12th at the Nelson Invitational during the fall where he carded a three-day total of 211.

"Another hard working member of the team, Kevin has had some strong rounds. With more tournament experience, his consistency will improve. That is when he will shine."

Also looking to leave his mark on the links will be sophomore Pat Phillips (Athens, GA). Phillips played in nine events last season with a 75.9 stroke average as a freshman. His top finish was a tie for 48th at the U.S. Intercollegiate.

"Confidence is the key for Pat. When he gets the taste of a few low rounds, he will be a big asset to the



team.”

Seniors George Downing (Santa Barbara, CA) and Del de Windt (Bloomfield Hills, MI) could also factor into the mix this season for Stanford. Downing saw action in eight events during the 2001-02 campaign notching a 76.6 stroke average through 18 rounds on the links. His best finish was a tie for 29th at the Oregon Duck Invitational where he posted a three-round total of 220. De Windt competed in three events for the Cardinal last season and has already matched that number this fall where he has a 75.7 stroke average in nine rounds.

“George and Del are a really important part of our plan. They have the ability and drive to bolster the team. I look for them to add a number of good rounds.”

The Cardinal have two new faces on The Farm in freshmen Kyle Gentry and Scott MacDonald. Both bring a wealth of experience at the junior level and impressive high school credentials to Stanford.

Kyle Gentry (Carmel, CA) is a 2002 graduate of the Robert Louis Stevenson School in Pebble Beach. The four-year letter winner captained his high school team his junior and senior seasons. He was tabbed the 2001 Future Collegians World Tour Player of the Year as well as the 2001 FCWT National Champion. Gentry was a 2001 FCWT first-team All-American as well as an American Junior Golf Association All-American. He was a three-time all-league selection.

“Coming off of a great junior career, Kyle is starting to understand the conversion from high school to college golf. He is going to set some records in his career at Stanford.”

Scott MacDonald (Playa del Rey, CA) is a 2002 graduate of Harvard-Westlake in North Hollywood. The four-year letter winner captained his golf team his senior year. He was a three-time all-league selection as well as the league MVP in 2001-02. MacDonald was tabbed an American Junior Golf Association Compaq Scholastic All-American (2001) and National Merit Finalist in 2002.

“Scott is young in golf circles,

but he is gaining fast. He has a great attitude. His future is bright.”

Stanford notched two top-10 finishes this fall with a third place showing at the Windon Memorial Classic and a tie for seventh at the Nelson Invitational. The Cardinal look to build on their fall performance and have a strong spring season.

“Spring is always where we shine. We play familiar courses and our line-up is steadier. We are ready to face all challenges.”

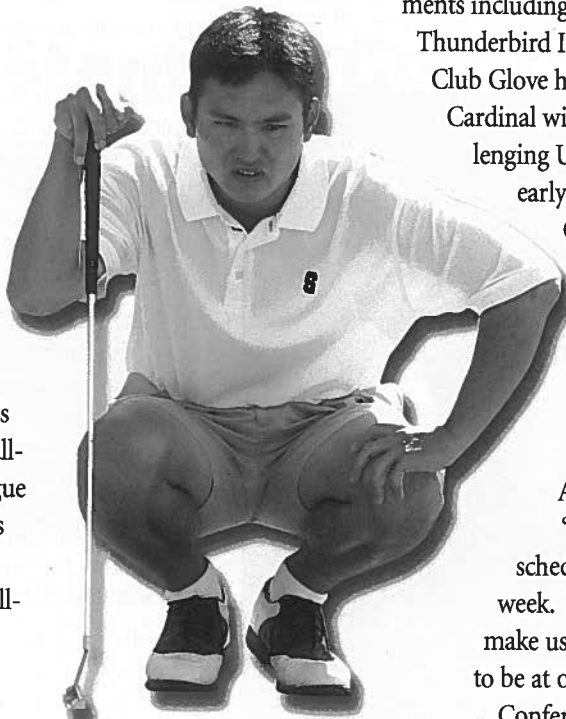
Stanford will face stiff competition this spring, playing at many highly competitive tournaments including the ASU

Thunderbird Invitational and the Club Glove hosted by USC. The Cardinal will also host the challenging U.S. Intercollegiate in early April at the Stanford Golf Course. The Pacific-10 Championships, which features some of the top teams in the nation, will take place at the end of April in Los Angeles.

“Our tournament schedule is tough every week. It will test us and make us better. I look for us to be at our peak for Conference and NCAA’s.”

Jeff Mitchell

Head Coach

Jeff Mitchell enters his third season as the head men's golf coach at Stanford after previously spending time on the PGA Tour as a professional golfer and as the director of golf at Texas Tech University.

Most recently, Mitchell was inducted into the Texas Tech Hall of Fame in 2001.

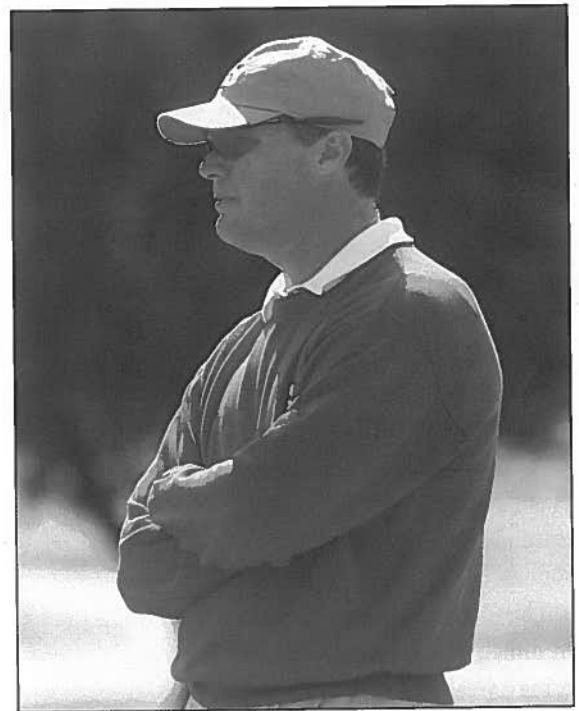
Mitchell spent the last 10 years as the head women's golf coach at Texas Tech, and in 1998, he became the director of golf for both the men's and women's programs. He was named District Coach of the Year in 1993 and '96 and the Southwest Conference Coach of the Year in 1994 and '96.

For nine years (1976-84), Mitchell was on the PGA Tour, playing in an average of 30 tournaments a year. He won the Phoenix Open in 1980 and had a dozen top-10 finishes (35 top-25 finishes) as well as making 111 career cuts. He competed in approximately 200 pro-amateur events and participated in over 100 clinics.

Prior to his coaching career, Mitchell was a member of the graduate faculty at Texas Tech and a teaching assistant, working as an instructor and camp director as well as teaching activity classes in golf, tennis and volleyball. As a professional instructor, Mitchell has given private and group lessons for the past 15 years and has been a junior golf camp director since 1990.

From 1986-87, Mitchell was the head golf professional at Golden Eagle Golf Course in Tallahassee, FL where he was responsible for arranging tee times, tournaments, all shop purchases, teaching, assistant professional training and golf course set-up. Prior to Golden Eagle, he spent a year as the Assistant Professional at Royal Oaks Country Club in Dallas, TX.

His work in the golf industry began over 30 years ago at Llano Golf Course in Texas. Mitchell worked in



the pro shop and became familiar with course maintenance for four years before moving to Pine Hills Golf Course in Lubbock where he experienced all of the duties associated with being an assistant pro and maintenance person. He also spent some time on the maintenance crew at Santa Teresa Country Club in El Paso.

A 1989 graduate of Texas Tech, Mitchell earned a degree in physical education and received his teaching certification in 1990. He competed for the Red Raiders' golf team from 1974-76, picking up All Southwest Conference honors as well as being named an honorable mention All-American.

For the last 10 years, Mitchell has been a member of the National Golf Coaches Association, and he's been involved with the Golf Coaches Association of America since 1998. He served as the first vice president for the NGCA from 1997-99, and was the legislative chairman from 1992-2000. A life member of the PGA Tour since 1976, Mitchell is also a member of the PGA of America.

In 1986, Mitchell conducted a marathon of golf, playing with one other professional for a continuous 24-hour period of time. They played 224 holes and received pledges, which they donated to the Ronald McDonald House of Lubbock. He also gave free junior golf clinics during the summers of 1988-89 in numerous places in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma. He was a Life Skills committee member at Texas Tech for two years, and he was part of the NCAA Sub-committed on Academic Integrity in 1998.

Mitchell and his wife, Christy, have two children (Jeffrey, 22 and Lesley 21), both of which are currently attending Texas Tech.



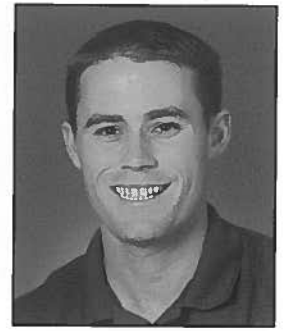
Head coach Jeff Mitchell and Assistant coach D.J. Powers begin their third season with the Cardinal.



D.J. Powers is in his third season as an assistant coach for both the men's and women's golf teams.

He came to The Farm after spending two years as the head coach of Santa Clara's men's and women's golf teams. In 1999, his women's team posted its highest tournament finish in school history – a second place showing at the Colby Invitational. The women's team also set and reset the single round scoring record eight times in two years. He was an assistant golf coach at Aptos High School in 1997 as well.

Powers, who graduated from San Jose State University with a degree in business management, was a four-year letterwinner at SJSU on the men's golf team. In 1996, Powers and his teammates finished 10th at the NCAA Championships. He was a three-time scholar athlete award winner while at SJSU. Powers will complete his MBA at San Jose State this year.

Stanford Athletics Home of Champions

Stanford captured a second-straight women's tennis NCAA team title in 2002 - and the Cardinal's 12th women's tennis title overall.



"Home of Champions." Those are the bywords for the Stanford University Athletic Department.

And for good reason. No athletic department in the country can boast of the kind of success that Stanford has accomplished since the 1980s. NCAA team champions. NCAA individual champions. Olympic medalists. Stanford University athletes have been all over the world capturing championships.

The statistics speak for themselves: Stanford University has won 66 NCAA team championships since 1980, the most in the nation; Cardinal athletes have won 43 NCAA championships since 1990 - again the most in the nation. Stanford has brought home 19 NCAA championship trophies the past five years, including an unprecedented six NCAA team titles in 1996-97. In 1991-92, Stanford athletes took home 29 individual NCAA titles - an NCAA record. Cardinal athletes won 21 individual championships during the 1992-93 season, the second most in history.

Even more impressive is Stanford's string of eight consecutive Sears Directors' Cup titles (1995-02). The award honors the nation's top overall athletic program and with eight straight #1 finishes, it's no wonder Stanford is considered the dominant athletic program in the nation.

Stanford captured its eighth straight Sears Directors' Cup in 2001-02 with 1499 points, winning the honor by 388.5 points over second place Texas. The Cardinal won a total of four NCAA team crowns with championships in women's tennis and women's volleyball, as well as men's and women's water polo. The Cardinal added second place national finishes in men's cross country, men's swimming and synchronized swimming. A total of 11 Stanford teams finished among the nation's Top Five and 22 among the Top 10. The Cardinal also picked up 18 individual NCAA titles and 14 team conference championships.

In 2000-01, Stanford won an NCAA Team Championship in women's tennis and had 15 teams finish in the top five nationally. The Cardinal also had 20

teams place among the top 10 and 26 among the top 25, to go along with 14 individual national champions and 12 conference titles. Stanford finished with 1,359 points in the Sears Directors' Cup standings to easily outdistance runner-up UCLA's 1,138.

Stanford has now won at least one NCAA team championship for 26 straight years. Cardinal teams have also won four or more NCAA team titles in a single year nine times, an NCAA best.

All totaled, Stanford has won 93 collegiate team titles (8 NCAA championships) and 367 NCAA individual titles. Cardinal women have won an NCAA-best 29 team championships while men's teams have captured 54 NCAA team titles, third best in the nation. Overall, Stanford's 83 NCAA team championships rank second in the nation.

In the last 10 years (since 1992-93), Stanford has claimed 31 national team championships and 34 NCAA team titles - the best in the country.

In 1999-2000, Stanford won the Sears Director's Cup by a wide margin for the sixth consecutive year. Stanford won team championships in men's tennis - its 18th overall in that sport - and men's track and field while placing second nationally in six other sports (baseball, women's volleyball, men's water polo, synchronized swimming, women's tennis and women's golf).

In 1999-2000, Stanford's football team won the Pacific-Conference championship and played in the Rose Bowl for the first time in 28 years while the men's basketball team earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament, tied for the conference title, finished 27-4 overall and held the nation's No. 1 ranking during the season. The Cardinal baseball team followed by sharing the Pac-10 crown and advancing to the College World Series, marking the first time in history that a school won Pac-10 championships in football, men's basketball and baseball in the same year.

Stanford has also enjoyed unequaled success in Olympic competition.

At the 2000 Summer Games in Sydney, Australia, Stanford University was represented by a total of 34 athletes and coaches. The Cardinal contingent won a total of 10 medals - four gold, three silver and three bronze.

At the 1996 Games in Atlanta, Stanford again placed 49 coaches and athletes on Olympic Teams, including three head United States Olympic coaches (Tara VanDerveer, women's basketball; Richard Quick, women's swimming; Skip Kenney, men's swimming). Stanford athletes accounted for 16 gold medals, one silver and one bronze in Atlanta.

At the 1992 Games in Barcelona, Cardinal athletes earned 10 medals - 10 gold, four silver and five bronze. If Stanford were a country, it would've placed 13th in the world with its 19 medals and nine with 10 golds. Thirty-eight Stanford-affiliated athletes and coaches participated in Barcelona while 41 members of the Cardinal family took part in the 1988 Olympic Games in Seoul, Korea.

National titles have become quite commonplace in the Stanford Athletic Department. In 1996-97, Cardinal teams set an NCAA record by winning six NCAA team championships in a single academic year: men's and women's cross country, men's and women's volleyball and men's and women's tennis. Nine other teams finished in the Top Four nationally, including second place finishes in women's swimming, men's swimming, men's water polo and women's synchronized swimming. Stanford also posted third place finishes in women's basketball, baseball and fencing, as well as fourth place finishes in women's golf and women's water polo.

The 1996-97 school year also saw the Cardinal football team advance to the Sun Bowl, the 18th bowl game in school history; the women's basketball team return to the Final Four, the baseball team qualify for the College World Series and the men's basketball team advance to the Sweet Sixteen of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since it won the 1942 NCAA title.

The following year (1997-98) Stanford won NCAA team titles in men's cross country, women's volleyball, men's swimming, women's swimming and men's tennis along with a U.S. Collegiate title in synchronized swimming. Also, 14 teams finished among the nation's Top Five, 19 in the Top 10 and 22 in the Top 20. Other teams finishing among the Top Five nationally included men's basketball, which made its first Final Four appearance in 56 years, women's tennis, men's water polo, women's water polo and fencing.

During the 1998-99 campaign, Stanford won one NCAA team title in women's tennis and one U.S. Collegiate Championship in synchronized swimming. Seven teams placed second in the nation, including men's cross country, men's soccer, men's swimming, women's swimming, men's track and field, men's water polo and women's water polo. Third place finishers included baseball, women's cross country and men's and women's fencing.

Cardinal teams also won 18 conference or regional championships in '98-99 - by far the best performance of any school in the nation. Stanford has now won 131 conference or regional titles since 1991, again the best in the country.

Not only has the Cardinal won an NCAA record six NCAA team championships in a single season (1996-97), but it has also won five NCAA titles in a single year on three occasions: 1991-92, '94-95 and '97-98. Cardinal teams have won four championships in a single academic year on five occasions: 1985-86, '86-87, '92-93, '93-94 and 2001-02.

gram to four NCAA titles in the 1990s and current head women's volleyball coach John Dunning guided the Cardinal to an NCAA title in his first season in 2001. Former men's golf coach Wally Goodwin led his team to the NCAA title in 1994, the first men's golf title at Stanford since 1953. Vin Lananna joined the championship parade in 1996 by leading both his men's and women's cross country teams to national titles. He came back in 1997 to lead his men's cross country team to another NCAA title and in 2000, his men's track and field team won the first national championship in track at Stanford since 1934.

Olympic gold medalists are numerous on The Farm. Former Cardinal standout Bob Mathias won back-to-back Olympic decathlon gold medals in 1948 and '52 while swimmers Pablo Morales, Jenny Thompson, Summer Sanders, Janet Evans and Misty Hyman have become household names in the swimming world.

Morales, who helped Stanford win three straight NCAA team championships (1985-87), won three medals at the '84 Games in Los Angeles (one gold, two silver) and two more gold medals at the '92 Games in Barcelona. Evans won three golds in the '88 Games in Seoul and one gold and one silver in Barcelona, while Sanders won four medals in Barcelona; two gold, one silver and one bronze. Thompson is the most decorated athlete in Olympic history with eight gold medals, a silver and a bronze. Hyman added her name to the list of Stanford swimming greats by winning the 2000 Olympic Gold Medal in the 200 meter butterfly to pull off one of the biggest upsets of the Sydney Olympiad.

Some of the great student-athletes in Stanford history include Tiger Woods and Tom Watson (golf), John McEnroe, Roscoe Tanner and Tim Mayotte (men's tennis), Kim Oden and Kristin Klein (women's volleyball), Kristin Folk (basketball/volleyball), Jack McDowell and Mike Mussina (baseball), Julie Foudy (women's soccer), Hank Luisetti, Brevin Knight and Mark Madsen (men's basketball), Jennifer Azzi and Kate Starbird (women's basketball), Jim Plunkett, John Elway and Troy Walters (football), Debi Thomas (figure skating), Eric Heiden (speed skating) and the great Ernie Nevers (football), to name a few.

It's no wonder Stanford University is often referred to as the "NCAA's Champion of Champions."

Stanford has simply dominated in several sports. Under head coach Dick Gould, the Cardinal men's tennis team has won 17 NCAA titles while the women's team has hauled in 13 national titles. The men's swimming program has won eight NCAA team championships, seven under current head coach Skip Kenney while the men's water polo team has captured ten national titles.

The Cardinal women's swimming team has won nine national titles, seven under current head coach Richard Quick. Quick has been the head coach for the United States Olympic Swimming teams in 1988 (Soul), 1996 (Atlanta) and 2000 (Sydney.) Tara VanDerveer, the 1996 United States Olympic Head Women's Basketball Coach, has led the Cardinal to two NCAA championships and five appearances in the Final Four.

Baseball coach Mark Marquess, who was the head coach of the gold medal winning 1988 United States Olympic baseball team, led the Cardinal to back-to-back College World Series titles in 1987 and '88. Former men's gymnastics coach Sadao Hamada led the Cardinal to three NCAA championships, now men's volleyball coach Don Shaw guided the Stanford women's volleyball pro-

"The City" has a population of 730,000 and is the centerpiece of the San Francisco Bay Area, which is the nation's fifth largest metropolitan region and registers a population of over six million and hosts over 16 million visitors each year.

The City is a cultural wonderland, an ethnic treasure chest where custom, tradition and history are preserved, celebrated and shared. From the vibrant counterculture in Haight-Ashbury to the young and glamorous tech survivors in their South of Market lofts, San Francisco is a golden dream come true.

Visitors and residents of San Francisco have a playground of diversity at their fingertips. Fisherman's Wharf, a must-see for all, includes waterfront marketplaces such as PIER 39, The Cannery and Ghiradelli Square. Golden Gate Park, Chinatown, North Beach, Union Square, Pacific Bell Park, the Embarcadero Center and, world famous cable cars and trolleys are just an example of what The City has to offer. The Golden Gate Bridge, San Francisco's signature landmark, looms as the gateway to the City by the Bay.

Lest you think that the valley is all business, though, spend a day at Paramount's Great America, delve into the wonders of technology at the Tech Museum of Innovation or explore the Winchester Mystery House.

One of the world's great stretches of coastline is located within a short drive from Stanford University. To the south is the Monterey Peninsula, which includes the picturesque coastal towns of Monterey, Carmel and Santa Cruz. The Monterey Bay Aquarium, Cannery Row and 17-Mile Drive along Pebble Beach are musts for visitors.

And if you bring your golf clubs, some of most famous golf courses can be found on the Monterey Peninsula, including Pebble Beach, Spyglass Hill and Cypress Point. The Beach Boardwalk, which features a historic wooden roller coaster, is located along the coast in Santa Cruz.

Further north along the coast is Half Moon Bay, Princeton-by-the-Bay, San Francisco and Marin County, located just across the Golden Gate Bridge. A short ferryboat ride past Alcatraz Island are the coastal towns of Tiburon, Larkspur and Sausalito.

A short drive north and east of Marin County gets you into the Napa Wine Country, home to dozens of well-known vintners. Within a few hours drive from the Bay Area is Lake Tahoe, home to some of the finest skiing in the country.

The Bay Area is also a mecca for some of the finest sports organizations in the nation. The Bay Area has two professional football teams (San Francisco 49ers, Oakland Raiders), two professional baseball teams (San Francisco Giants, Oakland A's), two professional soccer teams (San Jose Cyberrays, San Jose Earthquakes), one professional basketball team (Golden State Warriors) and one professional hockey team (San Jose Sharks)

Whether it's a cosmopolitan atmosphere, the cultural offerings of one of the great cities in the world, a visit to a coastal location, a trip to the Wine Country or skiing at Lake Tahoe, the San Francisco Bay Area remains one of the great destinations in the world today.

NCAA championships are commonplace at Stanford University. Cardinal teams have won NCAA championships at an unprecedented rate, including a national-best 66 since 1980 and 41 titles since 1990. Stanford has won at least one NCAA team championship for 26 consecutive years and has won at least four national titles in a single season nine times – again an NCAA best.

Stanford has won 18 national titles in men's tennis, 13 in women's tennis, 10 in men's water polo, nine in women's swimming, eight in men's swimming and seven in men's golf, among others. Nine Cardinal teams have won national championships.

Stanford Athletics has won 93 national championships. In NCAA competition, Cardinal teams have won 83 team titles, including 54 men's championships and an NCAA-best 29 women's titles.

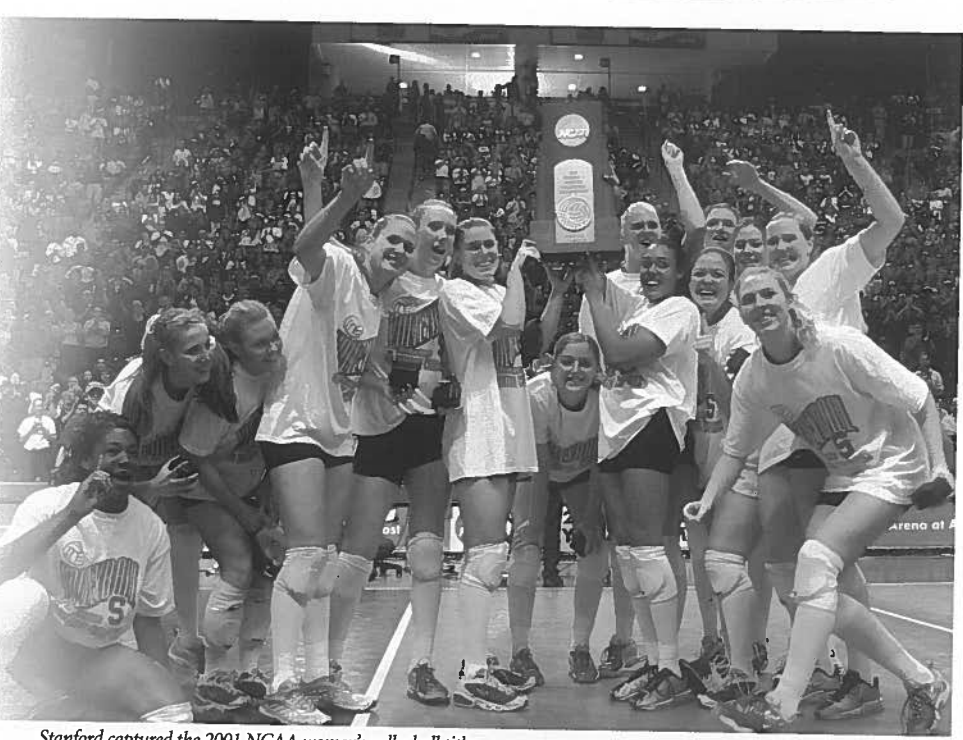

The Stanford University Golf Course was designed in 1930 by renowned golf course architects William Bell and George C. Thomas, Jr. Located in the foothills above the Stanford University Campus, the golf course is consistently rated one of the finest courses in the world. In 1998, the golf course was rated 91st in the country by *Golf Week Magazine* and in 1993 was rated 88th in the world by *Golf Magazine*.

Stanford University Golf Course is steeped in tradition. Throughout the years, Stanford has hosted many intercollegiate and non-collegiate events, including the Stanford Invitational, Pac-10 Championships, NCAA Western Regional, Women's NCAA Championships, USGA Junior Amateur Qualifying, U.S. Open Qualifying and a former Senior PGA Tour event, The Gathering at the Farm.

Stanford University Golf Course has also produced many influential golfers throughout the years. Such notables include former USGA presidents Sandy Tatum and Grant Spaeth, and PGA Tour professionals Tom Watson, Tiger Woods and Notah Begay III.

Did You Know??

Stanford hosted the first annual NCAA Women's Golf Championships in 1982.

The Stanford Golf Course is among the finest private courses in the nation, with a spectacular view from the 18th tee which looks out toward the San Francisco skyline.

Nineteen five-women teams and 17 individuals — for a total of 112 players — entered the competition on the par-73, 5,903-yard course.

Stanford/PEPSI Women's Intercollegiate

The 2003 tournament marks the 40th year the Women's Fall Intercollegiate has been a part of the Stanford Golf Course. The Cardinal has taken home the top prize in its own event four times: 1982, 1984, 1985 and 1997. Stanford's individual medalists include Joanne Pacillo in 1982, Kathy McCarthy in 1984, Julie Carmichael in 1985, Mhairi McKay tied for first place in 1995 and Hilary Homeyer in 1997.

Peg Barnard California Collegiate



This tournament began as the California Collegiate, but was renamed in honor of one of Stanford's strongest supporters, Peg Barnard. One of the most important legacies left behind by Barnard is the Buck/Cardinal Club, which she founded in

1978 and presided over in its initial few years. The Cardinal Club raised more than five million dollars in its first decade. In recognition of her support, the University named the annual spring intercollegiate championships the Peg Barnard California Collegiate in 1997.

The Nelson

Clarke and Betty Nelson, both Stanford graduates, are in their sixth season of sponsoring this yearly men's tournament.

U.S. Intercollegiate

The Cardinal men have won this event 11 times since 1968, including a string of six in a row from 1970-1975. Ten individual titles have been won by nine golfers. They are Sandy Aldeman in 1968, Gary Vanier in '70, Tom Watson in '71, Mike Pein in '76, Mike Milliken in '90, Casey Martin in '95 and Joel Kribel in '96 and '97.
